

**Death With the Wolves.**

WINNIPEG, March 24.—A party of loggers a few days ago stumbled over a pile of bones on the south side of Lake of the Woods. The bones consisted of a human skeleton and the skeletons of seven wolves. A revolver and seven empty cartridge shells were lying near, and it is supposed that the man was attacked by a pack of wolves and had made a desperate fight for life. An old explorer named McManus, who has lived at Rat Portage for years, has been absent on the lake for a longer time than usual, and it is feared that it is he who has fallen a victim to the wolves. The revolver and remnants of clothing, it is said, resemble those worn by McManus.

**Crazed by a "Prophet."**

OAKLAND, Cal., March 21.—As the time draws near for the fulfilment of "crank" Erickson's prophecy of the simultaneous inundation and destruction of San Francisco, Oakland, Chicago and New York by an earthquake, on April 14, believers here are becoming more and more excited. They are selling real estate at half its value and disposing of other property for a song to second-hand dealers. They will move to the surrounding hills out of harm's way. There will be an organised hegira under leaders, and daily prayer meetings will be held until the night of the 13th. Yesterday a piece of property assessed at \$10,000 was sold for \$6,000, and all the furniture in a nine-room house went for \$35. One devotee gave away several cords of wood, saying he wouldn't need it.

**A Lorne-Fife-Battenberg Alliance.**

LONDON, March 24.—An amusing story is going the rounds of the clubs to the effect that a "holy alliance" has been formed between the Marquis of Lorne, the Duke of Fife, and Prince Henry of Battenberg, the Queen's three sons-in-law, in order to protect themselves against the snubs of their royal relatives. "But I am also a royal highness," poor little Battenberg is reported to have exclaimed when brooding over his wrongs. "Yes, plated," said Fife and Lorne, who chanced to be present, in a breath. It is said that the alliance was suggested one day last week when the Duke of Fife happened to pay an afternoon call on a certain burlesque actress and found her reading a letter from Lorne. On leaving her residence the duke stumbled over Battenberg coming up the staircase.

**Scalded to Death.**

LONDON, Ont., March 21.—Word has been received in this city from Wadsville of a shocking occurrence whereby the wife of Hiram Crandell, a farmer, was the innocent cause of the death of their only child, a bright little girl of 4 years. Some other children were playing hide-and-seek around the premises and placed little Ella Crandell in an empty churn, putting the cover on in order to secrete her. The mother came to scald out the churn, and poured a kettle full of hot water through the hole in the lid. A piercing shriek from the little one told Mrs. Crandell what had been done, and she ran raving from the house. The child's face and body were terribly scalded, and it lived but a minute after being lifted out. The mother is distracted, at times calling for the child, and believing her experience to have been an ugly dream. The case is a sad one, and the bereaved parents have much sympathy extended to them.

**A Boy's Awful Deed.**

SOMERVILLE, Tenn., March 24.—Mrs. Sallie Hobson (colored) was a servant in the family of the Episcopal minister, and lived with her four children in a small house in the rear of the parsonage. Yesterday morning her husband, who had been in the country at work, called at the house with another Negro, and after a short stay started out for a walk. Returning half an hour later, he found on one side of the door the decapitated remains of his wife, and several feet away the head. A stick of wood on which the neck had been placed while the cutting was being done showed three distinct cuts of the axe. The woman's 11-year-old son was playing with the other children, his clothing saturated with blood. He at first claimed the blood came from a chicken which he had killed, but at the inquest admitted he had committed the crime. He said his mother laid her head on the block and told him if he did not cut her head off she would kill him. The boy's story is not believed, and he was placed in gaol.
