

The Trade Must Be Suppressed.

Since his return from the Dark Continent Stanley has missed no opportunity of dwelling on the horrors of the slave trade, which still holds a large portion of that benighted land in its deadly grasp, and which so far has defied the half-hearted and desultory efforts that have been made to suppress it. From the tone of his published utterances it would seem to be his idea that the European nations have a duty to perform in this matter, and that they owe it to their position as Christian and civilized people to remove the last vestige of a system that is crushing and degrading the dusky denizens of African jungles. If he is successful in arousing public sentiment on this subject and crystallizing it into an organized effort to suppress a disgraceful traffic, he will have added to the laurels he has won already another as worthy as any. If the nations on the continent decline to undertake jointly this grand and noble work, England may well consider if it is not again her duty, as it has ever been her glory, to lead in a great reform, and to assume a task in which she will have the sympathy, if not the active co-operation, of all civilized peoples. Now that so eminent an authority as Henry M. Stanley has drawn to the abuse the attention of the world, it cannot be allowed to continue, and if an expedition must be sent to stamp it out, no man is better fitted for its leader than the great explorer himself. His knowledge of the country, the climate, and the people fits him pre-eminently for the task, of which, if she stands alone, England must undertake the responsibility.—*News.*

Poisoned by a Tornado.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 25.—A week ago the family of Louis Prewitt, living near Lagrange, 20 miles from Louisville, was attacked by a virulent disease, the nature of which the local doctors were unable to determine. Its symptoms were similar to those of spotted fever, but no cause of such a disease could be found in the surrounding neighborhood. Dr. D. N. Porter, a physician of eminence, was called in and decided that it was "tornado poisoning." The germs, he said, were borne on the late tornado from some infected district probably hundreds of miles away and lodged in the vicinity of the Prewitt homestead. He claims that smallpox and other virulent diseases have thus been communicated to patients in many instances of medical history. One of Prewitt's daughters has died, and two others and a son are at the point of death.

Lumber Interests Badly Affected.

CHICAGO, April 29.—The carpenters' strike has seriously affected the lumber interests here. Lumber vessels have been lying at the lumber market for three to five days, there being no sale at any price, the buyers taking advantage of the strike to hammer the market down. At present there are some 10,000,000 feet of lumber on the market. The stocks on hand in the yards show an increase of 12,000,000 feet of hardwood lumber over that of last year at this time, and a decrease of 20,000,000 feet of pine. The shippers and buyers had laid out for a year of unusual activity. Freights are fair, and it is expected several large demurrage bills will have to be paid.

Navigation has opened at Parry Sound and the Soo.

There is as yet no news of steamships entering the St. Lawrence.

A wire worm is doing great damage to wheat near Atchison, Kansas.

Colonel Bruce, a noted turfman and breeder of the horse St. Gatten, the winner of the 1884 Derby, has committed suicide by shooting.

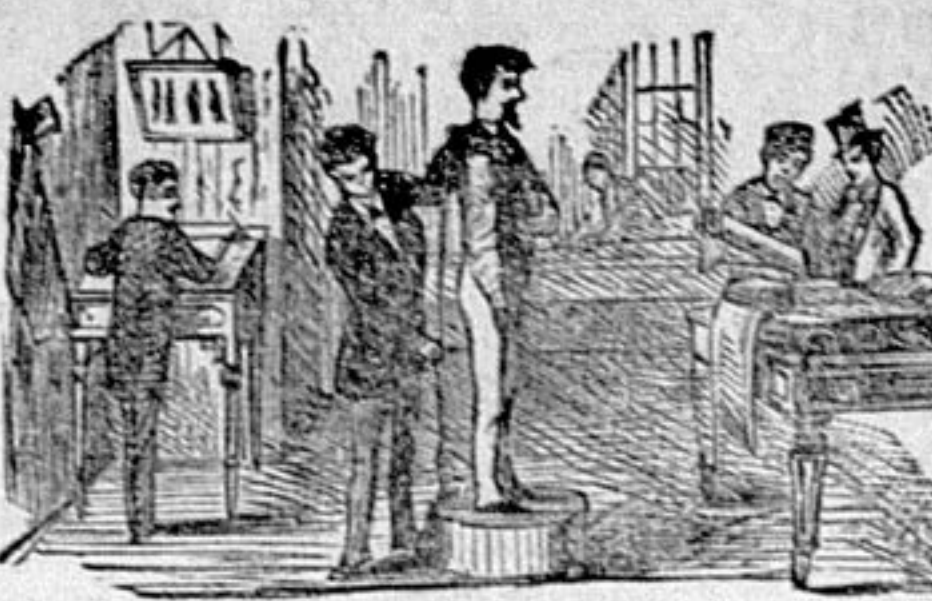

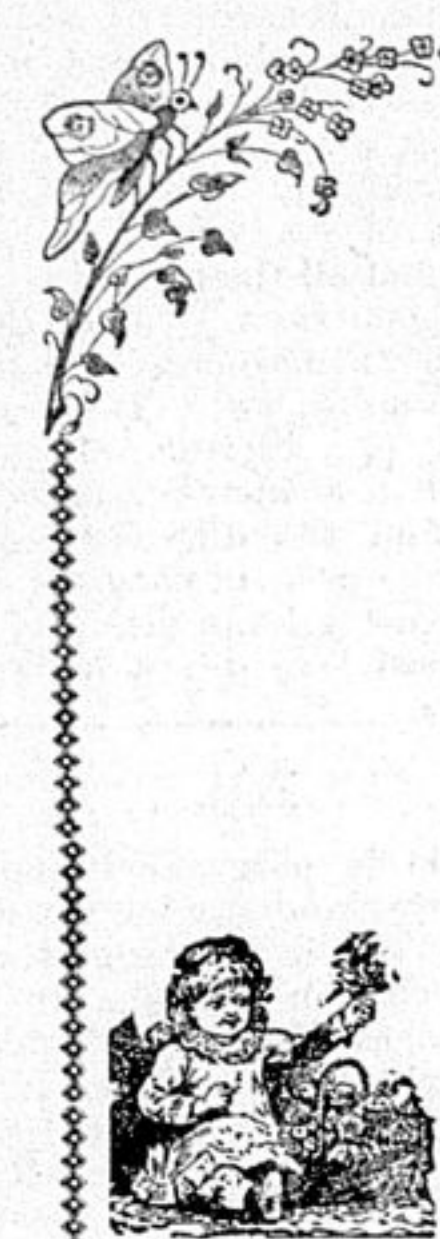

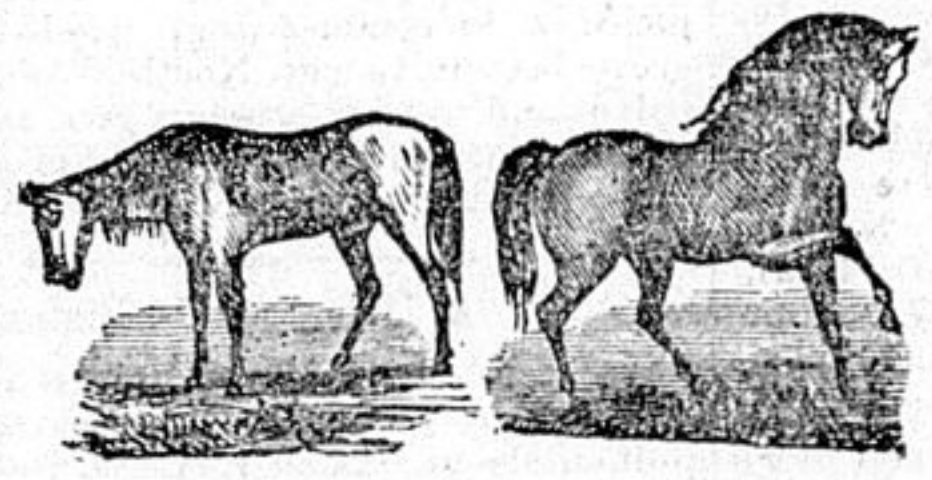
