### Prohibition in Dakota.

South Dakota has adopted prohibi-  
tion and every saloon in the State will  
be closed. The prohibition movement  
is much stronger in the West, where  
the country is sparsely populated and  
the inhabitants principally engaged in  
agricultural pursuits. In the large  
cities and the thickly populated States  
it has very little chance of being success-  
ful, the liquor interest being too strong  
for it. Whether it will be successful  
in Dakota remains to be seen. It is  
certain that States where prohibition  
prevails are not attractive to settlers,  
especially to Germans, who drink beer  
pretty much as Americans drink tea  
and coffee, that is as a beverage, and  
look upon all restrictive laws directed  
against it as oppressive. If prohibition  
were general throughout the States  
there might be some advantage in it,  
but as everything nowadays is judged  
from the monetary standpoint, the  
States where the liquor traffic is per-  
mitted are apt to be looked upon as  
freer and more business-like than the  
States where the traffic is prohibited.  
So long as there are supplies of liquor  
men will find them out. True prohibi-  
tion will prevail only when the manu-  
facture of the poison is everywhere  
suppressed.—News.

### Future Immigration.

Sir Charles Tupper, High Commis-  
sioner, in his annual report assures the  
Canadian Government that the class of  
immigrants that will come to Canada  
this year is in every respect superior.  
In previous years mechanics, general  
laborers and navvies have flocked to  
Canada, and instead of being a benefit  
to our country have forced the Canadian  
artisan to accept low wages. What  
Canada requires is men who have capital  
to invest in her undeveloped resour-  
ces, and especially those who have suffi-  
cient means to commence farm opera-  
tions in the North-west under favorable  
circumstances. Another redeeming fea-  
ture of the report is that hereafter no  
persons will receive aid to emigrate who  
are afflicted in such a way, physically  
or mentally, that incapacitates them  
from earning their own living. The  
indiscriminate methods heretofore em-  
ployed in selecting emigrants has entailed  
considerable expense on Canada, as  
many of them are to-day supported by  
houses of refuge and other charitable  
institutions. Every country should  
provide for its own poor, and Canada,  
in refusing to receive any more pauper  
emigrants, is acting in the interests of  
society generally.—Canadian Nation.

### Socialism a Fower.

The May Day demonstrations in Eu-  
rope passed off without anything more  
serious happening than the arrest of a  
few extremists in the various cities.  
Emperor William had no occasion to  
try his bayonets or sabres on rioters or  
disorderly persons, and it might be said  
that everything passed off pleasantly.  
But the countenance given to socialism  
by the Emperor is certain to have its  
effect after a while. Their meetings  
cannot again be put down as they have  
been in the past and they will have  
more liberty of action than they ever  
had before. It is the opinion of French  
Socialists that the great social upheaval  
which they have been looking for for  
years will begin in Germany shortly  
and spread over Europe. They have  
good grounds upon which to base their  
judgment, for German socialism was  
never in such a commanding position as  
it is to-day, having so strong a vote in  
the Reichstag that combinations of its  
opponents are necessary to keep it from  
having the balance of power. But under  
the patronage of the young and  
erratic Emperor, what a power social-  
ists might become.—News.

Several Chinamen who endeavored  
to find their way into the States from  
Lower California got lost in the desert,  
and one of them died from privation.

The sum of \$55,000 in gold coin was  
sent from San Bernardino to San Fran-  
cisco by mail a few days ago as second-  
class matter at one cent an ounce. An  
Insurance Company took a risk on the  
coin, and the bank saved \$150 by using  
the mail.

M. Pedrous, a physician at Nantes,  
France, has the strange gift of being  
able to see the color of sounds. He  
says that human voices are red, blue,  
black, tan, slate and all other colors,  
and that the color of some very hand-  
some women's voices is like buttermilk.
