### Crops and Live Stock.

The Ontario Department of Agricul-  
ture has issued a valuable and timely  
bulletin dealing with the crops and live  
stock of the Province. Of fall wheat,  
it says, the crop presents a very uneven  
condition throughout the Province,  
though there is reason to anticipate a  
fair harvest. Winter rye is satisfactory;  
clover is not very satisfactory, especially  
in Essex and Kent. Vegetation is re-  
ported generally rather backward, espe-  
cially in the east, but reports concern-  
ing orchards are, on the whole, favor-  
able. The season is declared to be fa-  
vorable for spring work, especially in  
the west. Ploughing has been delayed  
at some points in the east. The area  
of spring wheat sown will be enlarged,  
that of barley will be diminished. There  
is some experimenting with two-rowed  
barley. The decrease in the acreage  
of barley is attributed mainly to the  
low prices prevailing of late, and to fear  
that the United States tariff will discrim-  
inate against Canadian barley, and thus  
shut out that grain from its best mar-  
ket. The condition of live stock gen-  
erally is all that could be desired. The  
wheat in the hands of farmers is said to  
be but little. The supply of oats is a-  
bove requirements. Hay is abundant.  
There appears to be less store cattle than  
usual. Scarcity of farm laborers pre-  
vails in very few localities, but there is  
said to be a deficiency of first-class hands,  
and a great dearth of domestic servants  
in the country districts. Wages show  
a slight decline, save in the Lake Onta-  
rio and St. Lawrence and Ottawa coun-  
tries. Such is a very brief summary of  
the bulletin, which will be of great inter-  
est to the agricultural community of  
Ontario, and will demonstrate once more  
the value and efficiency of the Depart-  
ment by which it is prepared and issued.

### A Frightful Wreck.

The editor of *London Engineering*,  
who was permitted to inspect the en-  
gine-room of the City of Paris, gives  
the following description of what he  
saw:—In the engine-room itself the  
destruction was frightful. The whole  
of the low pressure engine was demol-  
ished, the thrust block destroyed, the con-  
denser had disappeared, and the rest of  
the machinery more or less ruined.  
The two standards supporting the low  
pressure cylinder, each weighing about  
fourteen tons, were both snapped off.  
The cylinder itself, weighing forty-five  
tons, was split in two, and the two halves  
lay on top of a miscellaneous collection  
of broken and twisted steam-pipes, iron  
rods, and levers, many of them many  
tons, but all twisted and distorted al-  
most beyond recognition. The connect-  
ing rod, which is 11½ inches in diam-  
eter, was still attached to the crank-pin,  
and had evidently acted as a huge flail  
in battering and destroying other parts  
after the accident had happened. These  
were the more important points noticed  
in the general wreck. The engine-room  
was provided with a double bottom, and  
was separated from the compartment on  
the opposite side of the ship by a longi-  
tudinal bulkhead as well as by trans-  
verse bulkheads from the boiler-room,  
which was forward, and the dynamo-  
room, which was aft. The after bulk-  
head was destroyed by the action of the  
shaft, the longitudinal bulkhead had  
three ragged holes in it, but the forward  
bulkhead was intact, and to this the  
escape of the ship from foundering was  
undoubtedly due.

### A Funeral in Small Boats.

COLUMBIA, Tex., May 16.—This town  
has been overflowed for two weeks. The  
first floors of the residences are sub-  
merged, the occupants being driven into  
the upper stories. There is not one  
thousand square feet in Columbia out  
of water. Business is suspended,  
churches are closed and the people go  
everywhere in boats. A novel scene,  
which has, perhaps, never before been  
enacted in Texas, was presented at the  
funeral of the late General Dobb. A  
large concourse of mourning friends,  
including the entire Masonic fraternity,  
followed the corpse to the cemetery,  
two miles from the town, in boats.  
There were forty-six boats in the pro-  
cession with an average of five occupants  
in each.

The tenants' defence fund in Ireland  
has been closed, the subscriptions reach-  
ing a total of \$300,000.
