The fees of the two surgeons who attended her in Vienna and operated on her left eye amounted to £1,600, and £1,000 has been paid for the hire of the villa at Frazensbad, where the Sultana is to go for a month before returning to Persia. The Sultana, who is just forty two, but who looks like a very aged . woman, has immense influence over the Shah, who is devoted to her, and, if she had died during the operation which she recently underwent, the astrologers who advised the journey to Vienna would assuredly have been beheaded.
