

Northwest Crop Prospects.

WINNIPEG, June 27.—The first Government crop bulletin of the season was issued to-day. Referring to spring wheat, the report says:—Though not put into the ground as early a date as last season, the prospects of the wheat crop on June 15 were most satisfactory. The seeding season was very favorable for pushing work, but growth was slow at the beginning. During the first half of May several night frosts occurred and the crop was pretty badly out down in many places, but later on warm weather and timely rains infused new life and crops advanced rapidly. Reports of correspondents are most encouraging and speak very hopefully of the success of the crop, if anything like an ample supply of rain falls. The growth was reported from many points as being much more than usually rapid, and the prospects for a large crop were most encouraging. The area shown to be under crop is 746,058 acres, being an increase of 122,813 acres, or twenty per cent. over that of last year. These figures bear out the impression pretty generally held during the seeding season, that the area would be largely increased. The area of oats under acreage is increased by 16,790 acres, and the acreage of barley reduced by 14,203 acres. There are 1,440 acres of flax under cultivation this year. The quantities of land fallowed, fall ploughed and ploughed during the spring for various crops of this season is shown to be 1,053,263 acres. This is 160,000 acres greater than last season.

The second farmers' excursion from Ontario arrived to-day shortly after 11 o'clock from Toronto. There were 169 excursionists on the train. They will be entertained at Griswold by the settlers there to-morrow.

A Woolly Horse.

New Yorkers are not easily taken a-back, but a large number of those who happened to be in the neighborhood of the Tribune building about 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon were considerably surprised, to say the least. At that hour a man seated in a buggy, and driving what at first sight appeared to be a horse, drew up at the curb. The man's name was Frank Fraundfelter, of Easton, Penn., and he said the animal was a "buffalo horse." He had just bought it from Oscar Stempler, in Monroe county, Penn., who had bought the animal's mother (a mare) out of a drove of Texas horses about twelve years ago. The "buffalo horse" is a gelding, fifteen and one-third hands in height, and weighs 1,100. It is completely covered with a coat resembling coarse buffalo fur in close curls eight inches long, growing equally thick and long on all portions of the body and legs. In the winter, Mr. Fraundfelter said, the hair grows much longer. This long, curly buffalo hair gives the horse a remarkable appearance, the more so as the hair on the legs is as dense as on any other part, making them look like four thick fur-covered posts. In its gait it resembles a cow more than a horse. Nevertheless, it is said to be a good roadster and has the pulling power of a mule. The shape of the animal's head is distinctly that of a buffalo, and in lieu of a mane there is an extra growth of brown hair. In its hind quarters, also, the horse closely resembles the buffalo. The owner said that neither he nor Mr. Stempler had ever heard of a similar animal. The latter had not been able to secure any satisfactory pedigree of it.—*New York Tribune.*
