The rise in the price of ice during hot weather is not all profit to the speculators, as a block of ice decreases about one-third in weight between the time it is stored in winter and the time it reaches its destination in July or August.

THE CAMERON LAKE MONSTER.—For some years past the existence of an aquatic monster in Cameron Lake has been well known; but what it was remained a mystery until last Monday afternoon, when Mr. W. E. Ellis saw and followed it for at least a quarter of an hour, while it swam lazily around a few inches below the surface of the water. He could easily have struck it with his paddle, but did not like to commence hostilities, as he was alone in a light canoe and cannot swim, and he thought it possible that the monster—which was over five feet long and of great bulk—might retaliate by upsetting him. Mr. Blott, to whom, amongst others, he was afterwards describing it, said that the creature was beyond all doubt a sturgeon, probably an old female rather late in spawning. Mr. Blott formerly lived near Lake Erie, in which sturgeons are very numerous, and he says they are so sluggish in the spawning season that he has scores of times seen men wade out and actually throw their arms around them before they would attempt to escape.
