

Several cases of leprosy are reported at Englishtown, Cape Breton. The hay crop in Ireland is ruined, and the condition of cereals and the turf is bad.

There have been about 3,000 cases of cholera in Japan, 60 per cent. of which were fatal.

Steps are being taken towards the establishment of the beet sugar industry at Guelph.

The crop in McIntosh county, N.D., is a total failure. A number of farmers have already asked for assistance from the commissioners, and supplies are being furnished. The same condition of affairs exists in some parts of South Dakota.

A patent was issued in Washington last week for a steel fence post. It is to be made of steel tubing, seven feet high, with a neat cap, and with bands to hold the barbed wire. It is said that these posts can be furnished complete for placing in position at 24 cents each.

"A man and his wife," reports a Springfield Republican correspondent, "walked into a Pittsburg hardware store the other day and asked to look at some nippers or pliers. A pair was shown them, whereupon the man calmly affixed them to one of his teeth, pulled the molar from his jaw, laid it with the nippers on the counter and asked for the bill."

Capt. Obed Knowlton, of the schooner Trader, at Advocate harbour, Nova Scotia, reports that while on his way from Boston he sighted what he supposed to be a wreck of a vessel. He at once bore down on it, when, to his great astonishment, he discovered it to be the carcass of a sea monster, unlike anything he had ever seen before. His vessel got within twelve feet of the monster, which seemed to be about 80 feet long and 20 feet broad. It tapered off at each end, was striped like a zebra and had the appearance of having been run into by a vessel.
