Birchall to be Hanged.

The Birchall murder trial, which commenced at Woodstock on Monday, the 22nd of September, came to an end last Monday night, when the jury, after a short consultation, returned a verdict of "guilty," and Birchall, who declared his innocence, was formally sentenced by Judge McMahon to be hanged on Friday, November 14th. No one who has read the evidence can doubt that the verdict was just, or that before the party left England Birchall intended to murder Benwell, and had fixed upon the Blenheim swamp as the scene of the crime. It is said that the condemned man is as lively and light-hearted as before the trial, but his wife is utterly prostrated by the conviction of her husband.

Great Fire at Kinmount.

On Friday evening last fire broke out from some unknown cause in Wm. Dunbar's hotel stable in the village of Kinmount, and in a little over an hour nothing was left on either side of the main street except Bowie's new brick hotel, World's store and an old blacksmith shop. As far as we can learn the losses and insurances were as follows:—Dunbar's Hotel, stables and sheds, loss above insurance about \$1000; J. Watson's store and dwelling, loss above insurance, \$2000; Jas. Wilson, general store and post office, insurance, \$4000 on building, no insurance on stock, partly saved; G. T. Henry, blacksmith shop, dwelling and implement store, loss on stock \$500; Mrs. Jewett's millinery and dress making store and dwelling house, stock total loss; M. A. Hopkins, general store stock insured for \$4000, part saved; Wellstood's boot and shoe shop, insurance not known; A. Moore's jewellery store, stock saved, no insurance on building, total loss; Curry & Johnston's drug store, estimated loss above insurance \$1000; Swanton, Brandon & Co's store, estimated loss \$6000; Orange Hall, insured for \$500; M. May's blacksmith shop, loss above \$200.
