The Model Cow.

The characteristics of a good useful cow were thus particularly set forth by Secretary Batchelder of Concord, N. H., in a recent address: "She should have a fine, long head; be broad between the eyes, the eyes should be large and mild, the muzzle thin and wide, the ears thin and the inside covered with yellow skin; the fore-quarters light, the body wedge-shaped, increasing in size to the rear, the legs flat with fine bones, the thighs thin, the bones of the rump set widely apart, the back broad and straight, the ribs and barrel round and well sprung, the tail long and fine, the udder large and full, extending well behind, and the large milk-veins under the belly should be full and tortuous. A fine horn, a deep yellow skin, and a general feminine elegance of form are also good indications. A well shaped escutcheon on the back of the thighs and under will do no harm, but experience proves that some very excellent cows lack this characteristic."

He further remarked, that 40 pounds of ensilage with eight pounds of hay, or 20 pounds of dry barley or oat fodder, or hay, was about the requisite feed for a 1000-pound cow, per day. An excellent grain ration for the production of milk in a 1000-pound cow, would be four pounds of gluten or cottonseed meal, two pounds of corn meal and two pounds of wheat or rye bran.

A cow that gives less than 3,000 quarts of milk, or makes less than 250 pounds of butter in a year, is unprofitable, and yet the average production is far below this. The average in New Hampshire is 150 pounds. At present prices, it costs 20 cents a day to keep a cow in the stable, as cows are usually kept, so that the cow that gives seven quarts of milk a day, that is sold for three cents a quart is very little benefit to her owner. Experience proves that a cow will yield a greater income by dropping her calf between September and November, or in the fall months, especially if she is turned out to grass in the spring. The green feed stimulates anew the flow of milk, and prolongs the milking season. Calves, he said, could be grown on skimmed milk with a little bran or grain after they were two or three weeks old, but a dissenter remarked that a flat-rumped animal betrayed its scanty early feeding. A calf that is full fed on warm new milk will have a rotundity of form that the other never possesses.

THE G. T. R. AND C. P. R.

A Combination of Interests Between These Two Great Lines Possible.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3, 1890.—From time to time rumors have gone forth that negotiations were on foot between the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways looking to a union of these two great trunk lines—or, if not a union, at least to closer relations, and, perhaps, a pooling of receipts. "Is there anything in it?" Is the question an interested public has asked? Thus far apparently there has not, but once more the attention of the public is conspicuously drawn to these roads, and the knowing ones assert that this time some united move is contemplated. But male strength is without doubt necessary to arrive at a very great age. More women, therefore, become old, but fewer very old. In the first half of a man's age, an active, even a fatiguing life is conducive to longevity; but in the last half, a life that is peaceful and uniform. No instance can be found of an idler having attained to a remarkably great age. Rich and nourishing food, and an immoderate use of flesh, do not prolong life. Instances of the greatest age to be found among men who, from their youth, lived principally on vegetables, and, in some cases, had never tasted flesh." Moreover, let those who will not marry take heed! The same authority just quoted declared that "there was not one instance of a bachelor having attained a great age, and that the fact was as applicable to the female as to the male sex." Many examples illustrative of this sensible theory will occur to the reader. Scarcely a week goes by but the fact may be met with of some aged individual dying, and testifying, in the number of children and of children's children to the force and truth of the physiologist's statement. The most notable instance of this was supplied in the matrimonial experiences of a centenarian Frenchman, a certain Dr. De Longueville, who lived to the age of 110. He had been married to no fewer than ten wives, the last of whom he wedded when in his ninety-ninth year, and who bore him a son when he was in his 101st!
