Sir John Macdonald has abolished the export duty on Canadian logs. There was a heavy fall of snow at Fergus Falls, Minn., on Monday.

An Alabama man poisoned his wife and four children because he wanted to marry a young woman in Texas.

The murderer of Col. Stewart, in Egypt, has been executed.

Very tall stories are being told of a new gold district in Wyoming.

Several more warships are to be built by the United States.

Madame Bonnet, the German spy arrested at Cannes, has been sentenced to five years' imprisonment and a fine of 5,000 francs.

At Lawrence, Mass., William McKenna, known as the king of horse thieves, has been sentenced to prison for 25 years.

The execution of Morin, the Montmagny murderer, who killed his partner Roy, has been postponed to November 26 to permit of a further appeal.

The Lamoreau murder trial at L'O. rignal has ended with a verdict of not guilty, although the judge charged strongly against the prisoner.

At Sherbrooke, Que., Remi Lamontagne was found guilty of murdering his brother-in-law, Napoleon Michel, and sentenced to be hanged on the 10th of December.

Mrs. James Coley, who died in Easton, Conn., a few days ago at the age of 110 years and 8 months, was probably the oldest snuff-taker in the world. She contracted the habit in 1790, and continued it up to the day of her death.

The little town of Saffron-Waldon, England, was the scene of much rejoicing over the safe return of young Pelly from Canada, where he is popularly believed to have had a narrow escape from the fate which overtook his companion, Benwell. The streets of the place were decorated with flags and arches, and the numerous friends of the Pelly family gave the returned wanderer a hearty welcome.

Birchall is working hard on his promised autobiography. There is much speculation as to what the nature of it will be; but it will not be a very elaborate affair, as the time is rather short. It will cover about 100 pages of foolscap and will be illustrated by sketches made by the author.
