Effects of the McKinley Bill on the Horse Trade.

CLINTON, Ont., Nov. 22 - The effect of the McKinley Bill on the horse trade of the Province is severely felt. The farmers up here have for years gone largely into breeding heavy Clyde horses, and the drop in prices that has followed the increase in the United States duty is a serious matter to them. Messrs. J Rattenbury and John McMahon of Seaforth were interviewed at the Rattenbury House, Clinton, the other day with regard to this trade. Mr. Rattenbury is one of the best informed men in the province on the subject of horses, and Mr. McMahon is one of the largest buyers of the west. They are both conservatives in politics, but both are convinced of the necessity of reciprocity. "I am a conservative "Mr. Rattenbury said, "but there is coming a change over this part of the country, and the people are turning towards reciprocity because they see that their interests demand it." With reference to horses he said .- " There has been a drop in prices of \$25 a head at least, and this during the past five or six weeks, since the McKinley bill menaced the trade.

"I used to ship on an average about two carloads of horses from this district every week during the late summer and fall," Mr. McMahon told me. "That would be about 28 head every week for 26 weeks say, or over 800 during the year. They were high-priced draught horses for Pennsylvania and heavy truck horses for Detroit. This year I have only shipped one car load. George Cox, the Detroit dealer, in other years would be up here half his time. He has not been here at all this year. The average price I have paid for horses is probably \$150, so that the purchase of the 800 horses that in previous years my shipment embraced would amount to a distributon of about \$12,500 among the farmers; and this by only one of many buyers. Now there are no horses going away, and, of course, no money coming in."-Globe Corr.

What Her Majesty Will Say.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Queen's speech, which will be read at the opening of Parliament to-morrow, was communicated at to-night's Ministerial dinners. The speech is of unusual brevity. After the customary reference to England's friendly foreign relations, the speech alludes to the negotiations with Portugal relative to Africa and with Italy concerning East Africa as not yet brought to a successful conclusion. A temporary arrangement with Portugal respecting the Shire River and waterways of the interior paves the way for an eventual treaty. The hope is expressed that the negotiations now progressing with France concerning the Newfoundland fisheries will soon lead to a satisfactory settlement, and the promise is made that the papers relating to the matter will be laid before Parliament at an early date. The Queen next alludes to the threatened potato famine in the west of Ireland. Her Majesty expresses regret at the existing condition of affairs, and says she trusts that measures will be taken to mitigate the people's distress. The speech further says that bills will be introduc d relative to land purchase in Ireland, tithes, assisted education and reform of private bill legislation sor Scotland and extention of local government in Englaud. If the work of the session permits, a bill relative to local government in Ireland will also be introduced. In minor measures to be submitted are bills relating to the liability of employers and to friendly societies and saving

Mr. Vankoughnet, deputy superintendent-general, rays that the department is regularly apprised by the agents on the different reserves of the condition of the Indians, and the latest reports showed no evidence of a disposition to participate in the fanstica craze which is creating the trouble &.
