Navigation is at an end for this season as far as the port of Montreal is concerned.

Mrs. Birchall and her sister, Mrs. West-Jones, left Woodstock last Monday for England.

The British steamer Westbourne was wrecked in the Black Sea and eighteen of her crew lost.

Four sheep herders in the Gallinar mountains of New Mexico have been killed by a hailstorm and 1,600 sheep are missing.

Great destruction by floods is reported from England, Germany and Austria. The Goethe statue at Carlsbad has been swept away.

The London Star, the Home Rule paper in England, says it has reliable information that Parnell will retire from the leadership of the Irish Nationalists.

At Lynn, Mass., the first church, known as "the mother of New England Methodism," has voted by 211 to 34 in favor of admitting women into the general conference.

The president of the Dominion Live Stock Association received a cable from England on Saturday that the Canadian cattle now landing are in a badly damaged condition, owing to the very heavy weather encountered in crossing the Atlantic. The Cassius of the Hansa line arrived at Aberdeen, having lost 100 head. The Sarica, which left Quebec on the 7th with 630 cattle shipped by Mr. James Aikens of Port Hope, Ont., is not yet reported, and grave fears are entertained for her safety.

Another interesting shipping experiment is going to be tried by the ss. Stenbuck, sailing on Friday. Mr. M. Thompson, the well-known cattle shipper, will export two carloads of turkeys, numbering a thousand. They will be landed at Aberdeen. Special fittings are being erected on the steamer. Should the turkeys survive the journey, further shipments will be sent in time for the Christmas markets. They cost 95 cents each laid down in Montreal, and it will take 3s. a head for ocean freight. They are expected to realize from \$1 to \$5 each.
