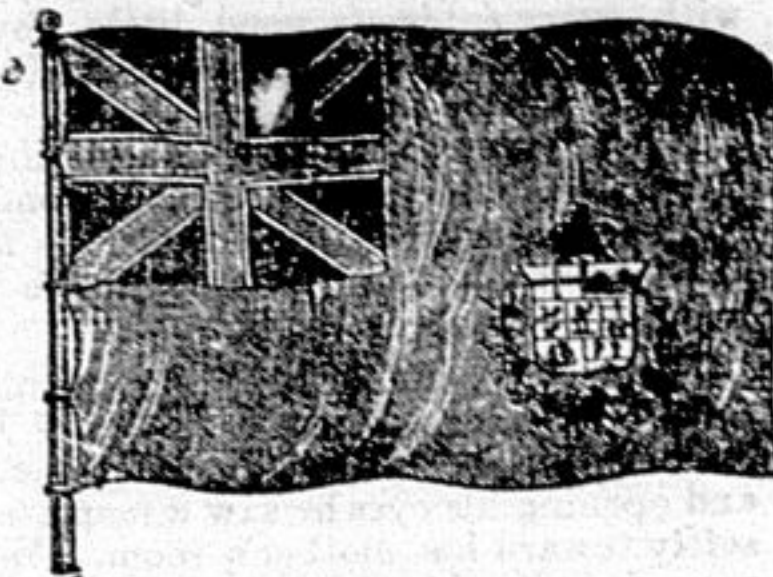

A Wonderful Escape From Death.

(From the Peterborough Examiner.)

Saturday evening about six o'clock information was received in town of an accident which had occurred at Downer's Corners, shortly after five o'clock. The circumstances of the case are most remarkable. Mr. William Hunter, an elderly farmer of Otonabee, was driving home with his daughter, and in crossing the G. T. R. track near the junction their buggy was struck by a tie train which was proceeding to Belleville. The train had been waiting on the Lakefield siding for the way-freight to pass down, and in pulling out the driver did not see the approaching equipage until too late to avoid accident. Those acquainted with the topography of Downer's Corners know that houses shut out the view on the north side of the crossing and render the place rather dangerous. It is said Mr. Hunter did not see the train until too late, and his horse becoming frightened and unmanageable, he allowed it full rein in the hope of clearing the track before the train reached the crossing. But another buggy ahead of him blocked the way and prevented the success of this attempt. A collision occurred. Mr. Shaughnessy, who was driving ahead of Mr. Hunter, just cleared the track, but Mr. Hunter's buggy was struck squarely in the middle. The vehicle was smashed, the horse stripped of every vestige of harness but not injured in the least, Miss Hunter was hurled some little distance down the embankment, and Mr. Hunter found himself sitting on his buffalo robe upon the pilot of the locomotive, with the lines still in his hands. He clung tenaciously to his perilous seat, and after a thrilling ride of about an eighth of a mile in this precarious position, the train was stopped. The engineer had observed the accident and put back to ascertain what damage had resulted and do as much as possible to repair it. Mr. Hunter, whose appearance in such a strange manner greatly surprised the train hands, rode back with them. He was badly shaken up but almost miraculously escaped without any positive injury. Miss Hunter was also favored by Providence, and besides a severe shock from her fall, and a cut on the side of her head, she did not suffer from the mishap. Both were taken into the residence of Mr. Dawson and Dr. King summoned, but his professional services were not necessary, their injuries being so slight. It was a close call, and Mr. and Miss Hunter are being congratulated on their fortunate escape. No blame attaches to the trainmen.

Black diphtheria has appeared in Cornwall, Ont.
