The second topic is much more serious officials remaining, beginning with the prime minister himself, are reduced sometimes to a third of the present amounts. The sixty-seventh article of the constitution provides that a large portion of the expenditure, classed as "fixed expenditures," shall not be reduced by the diet without the penditures. The lower house, however, has resolved that this ordinance is ultra vires, and has interpreted this clause of the conto that of the government, and in a such a way as to largely reduce the items of exdeal without the concurrence of the latter. Both the prime minister and the minister declared that the government would, if the house persisted in its course, announce its dissent and take other measures provided by the constitution.

The Sons of the Sunny Peninsula Are the Champions in Homicide.

Italy has an evil pre-eminence in Europe for murders. Dr. Basco, an Italian authority, in his monograph on "Homicide" gives Italy 3,606 trials a year for murder, with a population of 23,000,500 over 10 years of age; while France Great Britan and Ireland, Belgium, Austria-Hungary and Germany have but 2,777 a year, with a population of 128,500,000 over ten. ### How People Starve in London.

Mr. Coroner Baxter opened an inquiry at the Seamen's Chapel, Ratcliffe, on the male child of Thomas Smith, a carman out of employ, of 1 Ashley Place, Stepney Causeway, E. The case revealed shocking destitution through want of work. Smith stated that through The slackness in trade he had only got odd jobs from time to time. All his furniture was sold to buy bread for his wife and family. For the past six weeks the only food they had was bread. On Wednesday last he got a day's work, but broke down exhausted after an hour's trial. On his return home he found his wife had prematurely given birth to the deceased on the bare floor. There was no doctor to attend his wife, and the child after eight hours expired. He applied to the parish to bury it. An official visited the house, and his wife and his eldest child were removed next day by order of the doctor. He never received any relief from the parish, but now he was under the care of the doctor, and was getting medicine, but no food. The poor fellow looked so wretched that the Coroner gave him two relief tickets. James Berry, relieving officorroborated all the poor man had said. He found the family in a dreadful state of destitution and semi-starvation, and took immediate steps to relieve the mother and the eldest child. The Coroner's officer said that there was not a stick of furniture in Smith's place, and that when he gave them some food there was no person strong enough to cook it. The jury adjourned the hearing of the case for a week, and went in a body to view the state of the rooms occupied by Smith.
