Lynched Three Times.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH OF A MAN WHOM
MOBS COULD NOT KILL.

MILAN, Tenn., July 10.—A Texan
named Garrett Hume died here yester-
day of strangulation. His death was
caused by the action of a device which
he adopted years ago to outwit lynch-
ers. Hume was a herdsman on a ranch in
South western Texas 18 years ago. He
soon became a rich rancher. The co-
incidence that existed between his ac-
quisition of wealth and the disappear-
ance of cattle belonging to others caused
an agitation that resulted in his disap-
pearance. He went to Galveston, where
he had a silver tube inserted in his
throat. Then he returned to his ranch.
In a short time the lynchers caught
him and left him hanging to a tree. He
wasn't as dead as they supposed, but
got away and began operations in an-
other part of the State. A second hang-
ing proved as ineffectual as the first and
he went to the Mexican border. The
third attempt came near proving effect-
ual, for the lynchers left guards to watch
him, but a negro cut him down next
morning and he escaped to Mexico,
whence he came here several years ago.

Bloody Faction Fight.

FAMILY FACTION FIGHT WITH PISTOLS,
CLUBS AND KNIVES.

ERIE, Pa., July 11.—Edindore, the
seat of the Edindore State Normal
School, was the scene of great excite-
ment last night. There was a bloody
battle between the Sweet and Cobb fam-
ilies on one side and the Andersons and
McGahans on the other. A month ago
Frank Anderson was arrested at the
instance of Sweet for larceny. The
prosecution failed. Since then an open
warfare has prevailed between the
Sweets and Andersons, and Sweets'
sheep and cattle have been indiscrimi-
nately shot and maimed. Warrants were
sworn out, and Erie officers started to
arrest the Andersons. Frank Sweet
and Chas. Willis Cobb moved across
the Anderson domain Thursday night,
and the Andersons, Frank, Delos and
Rosell, and Ransom McGahan, another
neighbor, opened fire. The fire was re-
turned and the contest was carried on
at long range for some time. The An-
dersons charged the enemy, and Frank
Anderson fell shot through the breast.
After the ammunition was expended,
fists, knives and clubs were brought into
requisition. When the Erie officers
reached the battle field, they found
Cobb with his throat slashed from ear
to ear, but not deep enough to reach
the jugular. All the parties were in-
jured, but Frank Anderson was the only
one whose recovery is in doubt. All
the parties are under arrest and will be
arraigned to day on charges of shooting
with intent to kill. It is feared blood-
shed will result from the meeting in
Edindore, as friends are ranging on
either side. All the parties engaged
are from good families.

The harvest in Hungary will be of
good quality, though diminished in
quantity. In Bulgaria the crops will
be both plentiful and good.

Enormous caverns have been discov-
ered in Josephine County, Oregon, 12
miles north of the Californian line and
40 miles from the coast.

The Duke of Cambridge, commander-
in chief of the forces, has issued an or-
der closing and forbidding the formation
of Orange lodges in the army.

Forest fires are raging in the vicinity
of Escanaba and St. Ignace, Mich.
Crops and timber have been destroyed
to a large extent. In the northern pen-
insula the destruction is particularly
great.

An immense downpour of rain for
three hours on Friday at Sioux City,
Iowa, flooded the city, causing a loss of
\$100,000. The injury to pavements
alone will cost the city \$10,000. Sever-
al buildings were undermined.

At Aspen Junction, Col., on Saturday
night a yard engine ran into the rear
of a passenger train. The check valve
of the engine was displaced and the
steam rushed into the car, leading to
death seven persons and badly injuring
six others.

Emperor William in a speech at Lon-
don on Friday expressed his desire for
peaceful progress, friendly intercourse
and the advancement of civilization.
The imperial procession from Bucking-
ham Palace to the Guildhall was wit-
nessed by thousands of people, who warmly
received the German ruler.
