CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

Sir,—In your issue of last week there is a short editorial headed "Answers Wanted." In glancing over the minutes of the last meeting of the village council, as published in the same issue, I find a few items of much more importance, which I should very much like to have explained. Among the items of taxes returned to the County Treasurer for collection, there are the following: "Joseph McArthur, north of Francis east of Colborne, east part of 7, \$4 80." Who is this Joseph McArthur who has not sufficient goods on which to levy that small amount? Also, "Do. do., south of Louisa north half 1, \$4 65; Do. do., south of Louisa south half 1, \$9 97—total, \$18 42." Now I would like to know by what authority this is done. How did the collector dare to make the statutory affidavit that this man has no goods? Does he know the meaning of the word perjury; or did the council pitch the law to the winds, take the roll of his hands, and release his sureties without the requisite declaration? Why, sir, it is on this lot I south of Louisa street that—nestling beneath the shade of its spreading cedars and apple blossoms—Bessie H. rears its stately head! Is it because the Laird thereof is elder brother of the gentleman who honors the village by presiding at the council board that this piece of jobbery is perpetrated? It was only the other day another gentleman's goods were knocked down to the highest bidder by this same collector for a small amount of taxes which would otherwise have been returned against property belonging to the *reeve himself*; and now, for some reason, the law is set at defiance to relieve his brother, the village millionaire, of a trifling liability, by this very obliging council. Will they not take the ratepayers sufficiently into their confidence to tell them the reason why? And, while I am about it, allow me to mention another matter which might be susceptible of explanation. It is rumoured around that there was some little difficulty in raising funds to pay the school teachers their last quarter's salary. What has become of the money raised last fall for that purpose? Have we another Davis; or has the money been retained in the village treasury and used for ordinary village purposes? The school money is levied on the whole school section, which is composed of Fenelon Falls and a part of the townships of Fenelon and Verulam, and should have been handed over to the treasurer of the school board as soon as collected, and by him paid out on the order of the board. Why should that individual be retained in office and paid a salary if his work is done by the municipal treasurer direct? And if there was a lack of funds the other day, or if paying the teachers cleaned out the treasury, where is the next quarter's salary to come from? That sum will fall due and be payable before the current year's assessment can be levied. What has the school board—notably Mr. Naylor, an old campaigner, and who used to view things differently—been about to allow such a state of affairs? Surely our good village has suffered enough already by allowing things to get mixed and "robbing Peter to pay Paul." Are we drifting back into the old track? Must we be taught another expensive lesson before we compel the men placed in offices of trust to pay some little attention to the law while handling the funds of the public?
