The Abbott Cabinet.

A GLANCE AT THE CHARACTERISTICS OF
THE VARIOUS MEMBERS.

(From the Hamilton Times.)

Look at his Cabinet: Sir Hector
Langevin without a following, discor-
ded in his own Province, with frightful
charges hanging over his head, and like-
ly soon to be driven in disgrace from
public life.

Mackenzie Bowell—A respectable
mediocrity who has managed the De-
partment of Customs so as to make it
obnoxious to every importer in the
country, who obtained his seat in the
Cabinet by riding his Orange horse, and
who has succeeded in earning the con-
tempt of the Orange body. The Tories
of Ontario are crying for his removal.

J. A. Chapleau—A clever charlatan,
who succeeded in identifying his name
with more scandals for the few years he
was Premier of Quebec than any man
of this or any age. He is a person in
whom no one has confidence, and his
presence in Mr. Abbott's cabinet is a
perpetual menace to its tranquillity, for
he lives in a constant atmosphere of
intrigue.

Sir Adolphe Caron—A ridiculous
dude, devoid of every form of capacity,
laughed at by friend and foe, sneered
at by Lady Macdonald, who always re-
ferred to him as "dear Adolphe." Even
the Tory party cannot swallow him, and
he is to go soon—probably to Spencer-
wood as Lieutenant Governor of Quebec.

Sir John Thompson—The only man
in the Government who has any execu-
tive capacity, but devoid of all political
instinct. The sole hope of his party,
yet hedged about with religious prej-
udices which preclude his further polit-
ical promotion. He has an inbred dis-
like of political turmoil, and will likely
either take a seat on the bench or retire
to practice at the first opportunity.

John Costigan—An utterly incompe-
tent man, who got his position by ac-
cident as a representative Irish Catholic.
Does nothing and is good for nothing.

John Carling—A wealthy old brewer
that Sir John Macdonald insisted upon
taking into the Government and keeping
there for some occult reason which no-
body could ever fathom. He was de-
feated last March in his own city, Lon-
don, a strong Tory hive, and pitchforked
into the Senate. Never says anything,
and is not known to have any ideas.

C. H. Tupper—Son of his father; too
insignificant for notice.

George E. Foster—An elongated doc-
trinaire, who began life as a pedagogue,
obtained fame as a temperance spouter,
got into the House as a prohibitionist—
into the Government by swallowing his
convictions and toadying to Sir John.
He barely escaped defeat last March,
has a petition hanging over him, will
probably be unseated and defeated, and
sink back to the obscurity from whence
he sprang, "unwept, unhonored and
unsung."

Edgar Dewdney—The most conspic-
uous example of an accident in the whole
range of political history. He has good
looks and good manners, and he and
his wife happen to be social favorites of
Lady Macdonald. She consequently
got him appointed Governor of the
Northwest, where his administration
stank in the nostrils of every settler and
drove the Indians to rebellion. Having
earned the hatred of the whole North-
west and the contempt of the rest of the
Dominion, Sir John, to the amazement
of everybody, put him into one of the
most important departments in the Gov-
ernment, and kept him there in spite of
protest. He cannot long survive with-
out his patron.

John Haggart—A gook-natured me-
diocrity, who spends most of his time
in playing billiards at the Rideau Club,
without the slightest pretence to polit-
ical knowledge or ability of any kind.

This is the Cabinet that Mr. John
J. C. Abbott presides over. It has not
one man in it with the instincts of a
politician, except, perhaps, Chapleau,
and his reputation is too shady to per-
mit of his being made conspicuous. It
is a Cabinet of mediocrities, which does
not even command the respect and con-
fidence of its supporters in the House of
Commons. Plus Sir John, it is all
right. Minus Sir John, it is nothing.
When they go out together they never
will be missed.
