

Great Crops in the Northwest.

With more than a quarter of a million acres under crop more than last year, and with the most promising prospects so far, the reports from all parts being unanimous as to the fine condition of the grain, Manitoba this season will far outdo herself. So great a product is expected that the capacity of all the railways will be taxed to the full, and to meet the demand the Canadian Pacific railway will add about two thousand more freight cars to its rolling stock in order to be in a better position to handle freights. Such a great crop as is expected, and without doubt the expectation will be realized, means the circulation of a very large sum of money, reaching into the millions, in the Northwest, and all will reap the benefit. It will benefit the province and the country generally in another way. It will further advertise the greatest wheat producing country in the world and attract more settlers to share in the prosperity which has come uninterruptedly to the agriculturist there for some years past. While the farmers in the American States to the south are struggling with all sorts of drawbacks and difficulties, the Manitoba farmer has been prosperous, and the never-failing crops which he has gleaned must make many relinquish their holdings in unproductive Dakota and Kansas, that they may remove to and share in the riches to be won in the great wheat belt. There is room for millions of settlers in the Northwest, and no where in the world could a man get better returns for his labor than there. This fall will see a phenomenal output of breadstuffs from the prairie country, and everyone who participates in the profit will have in his pocket ample testimony of the prosperity of the new land.—News.

Smallpox is raging at Tegucigalpa, one of the largest towns in Honduras. Fifty more destitute Russian Jews arrived in Montreal last Monday by the Allan steamship Circassian. Rev. C. H. Spurgeon, who a few days ago was believed to be at the point of death, is now said to be recovering. There is an absolute potato famine in some parts of Maine, and the people have eaten no potatoes for several weeks. The old crop having been exhausted and no new ones imported. Two men of Jackson, Mich., bear odd relations with each other; yet they are no relation. Alderman James Mitchell and Engineer James Mitchell are their names. Their wives bear the same Christian names, both have two boys and a girl that bear the same names and whose ages are the same. The rural assembly of the province of Kasaan, Russia, where the distress is most acute, has decided to apply to the Government for a loan of \$5,000,000 roubles. The rural assembly will also ask for a delay in the collection of the peasant taxes, and will request that the manufacture of brandy from corn be prohibited, and that the brandy shops be closed for a year. A general appeal for funds to assist the suffering people has also been issued. Near Dayton, Ga., there is a well locally known as the "well of frozen air." In drilling the well a stratum of frozen clay and gravel was encountered at a depth of fifty-five feet. After passing through five feet of this numerous cavities were encountered from which the cold air came in gusts. The escape of the air from the well can be heard roaring for nearly 200 yards. A bucket of water set over the opening will freeze through and through within a few hours.
