The Last of the Season.

The last cattle ship of the season, the Lake Winnipeg, sailed from Montreal on Saturday, the 21st, and the trade, as far as the St. Lawrence is concerned is now closed. The number of cattle exported from the port of Montreal this year has been 108,628 head, while about 5,000 have been sent via New York and Boston, and 21,082 sheep have likewise been shipped from this port during 1891. Last season the shipment of cattle from Canada was somewhat heavier, the figures being 123,627 head and 43,739 sheep. The trade during the season just closed was carried on by 232 steamships, each making four, five and some of Allan's steamers went as high as six trips. The number of head of cattle lost was 1,300, which is a decrease compared with the previous season, and the ports to which the stock was exported were Glasgow, Liverpool, Bristol, Dundee, Aberdeen, Newcastle and Hamburg. In conversation with Mr. Robert Biekerdike, Mr. W. Cunningham and other gentlemen connected with the trade, the *Empire* learned that there were few of the shippers quite satisfied with their season's profits. One of the above observed that the whole system would have to be changed, and what is known as current rates of freight abolished. A shipper stated that when cattle were bringing a good price on the other side, the steamship companies would be so informed by cable and their freight rates would go up accordingly; "and in fact," he added, "the steamers get all."—*Empire*.

Great Snakes!

A man named Riede, says an Iowa exchange, had a thrilling experience with snakes in the vault of an old French brewery at Dubuque, Iowa, a few days ago. It is related that he went into the vault to see about having it cemented when his attention was attracted by a rattling noise. He could not see very well, but began looking around to see where the noise came from and came near stepping on a monster rattlesnake, which struck at him. Mr. Riede left the cellar in a hurry and returned with a shotgun and a light. He fired one barrel and killed the big snake, the report arousing many others, eight of which he killed with the other barrel. "The large snake was nineteen feet three inches long and had eighteen rattles. The others killed were only about three feet in length." The man had not been drinking.

Looks as if He Winked.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—To strangers, at any rate, the "tic" of the Prince of Wales is somewhat disconcerting. About once in every minute and a half the lid of the right eye drops completely over the ball. The eye remains closed for the space of about a second, and then suddenly opens again to its fullest extent, no other feature of the face having moved meanwhile. People who see the Prince for the first time are tempted to believe that he is deliberately winking at them, an impression which is strengthened by the Prince's reputation of geniality toward men and gallantry toward women. Of course, however, there is no such intention on the part of the Prince, and the wink is altogether involuntary, the result of a "tic nerveux."

Raising Black Cats.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 20.—James Wardner, of the Consolidated Black Cat Company, is now here from Fair Haven, Wash. He is one of the stockholders of a novel company just organized on Puget Sound for the propagation of black cats. An island is to be purchased, so that the cats can not intermix with other cats of the surrounding regions, and there the black-cat breed is to be perpetuated. The black cats will live on fish, thus the expense of running the big cat ranch will be reduced to a minimum.

The cats are to be grown for their fur, and the projectors expect to make millions out of it. Most of the original stock will be brought from Holland.
