Greed For Gold.

HORRIBLE CRIME IN HUNGARY.

VIENNA, Dec. 11.—A tragedy unpar-
alleled in atrocity is reported from
Weiselburg, a town of Hungary, 21
miles from Preburg. Sixteen years ago
the son of a poor peasant living in the
county of which Weiselburg is the capi-
tal went to America. There by industry
he gradually saved up about \$3,000 in
American money. Resolving to return
to his father's home, the son on his way
changed his money into the compact
form of English sovereigns, of which he
had 600. It was late when he arrived
at his father's house. He did not make
himself known but asked for hospitality
as a stranger. The mother was not
there at the moment, but the father re-
cognized his son through the disguise of
years and embraced him. The son be-
ing weary retired to rest, after telling
his father of the little fortune he had
brought home with him. The son had
the money in a bag near his head. The
father did not tell the mother when she
came who the stranger was, resolving
to wait until morning and then let the
son reveal himself to the joy and sur-
prise of the mother. The latter got up
during the night and examined the
stranger's baggage, and finding the mo-
ney a larger sum than she had ever
dreamed of, determined to possess it.
The husband and father slept on. The
mother stealthily got a knife and cut
the throat of the stranger, killing him
instantly; then she took and hid the
gold. When the father awoke he found
his son in a pool of blood on the bed.
His cry of anguish and horror aroused
his wife, who had expected to find her
husband a ready accomplice in conceal-
ing the crime for the sake of the money.
The father gasped out who the victim
was. With one cry the murderers re-
eled and fell dead.

Russia's Awful Distress.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—The *Chronicle's*
St. Petersburg correspondent says:
"Matters here are drifting from bad
to worse. The whole energy of the De-
partment of Finance seems centred on
manipulating funds on the Berlin and
Paris exchanges. Despite reports of
gold imports, the Imperial Bank return
does not show an increase. There is
nothing to show whether the gold has
been locked in the war chest or what
has become of it. All classes are dis-
couraged because of the half-heartedness
of the Government in coping with the
famine difficulties. The consequences
of the famine are only beginning to be
realized. Merchants complain that the
probabilities of grain export have lock-
ed up capital, and there is no circula-
tion of money. The nobles are unable
to collect their revenues, and therefore
decline to pay what they owe shopkeep-
ers. The cessation of court festivities
causes dire distress to small tradesmen.
The famine funds have been frittered
away by local authorities. The grand
remedial measures exist only on paper.
Complaints of enormous expenditures
on the army and navy have been taken
advantage of by those who are un-
friendly to the Government. The whole
empire appears to be a seething mass
of discontent.

An Austrian priest and three nuns,
who were captured by the Mahdi at
Kordofan in 1883, have just succeeded
in escaping.

Joseph McKay, who is in jail at
Ukiah, Cal., charged with stage ro-
bery, turns out to be son of Joaquin
Miller, the poet of the Sierras.

Miss Mary Smith, of Whitesburg,
Ga., is the proud possessor of a bed
quilt quilted over one hundred years
ago by Miss Taylor, a niece of General
Zachary Taylor, who picked and spun
the cotton of which it is made.

Mrs. Lewis P. Cowell, of New York
city, attached a piece of hose to a gas
burner, turned the gas on, then took
the other end between her teeth and
went to bed on Saturday night. Her
room was broken open next day by
neighbors, and the hose was still be-
tween the teeth of the lifeless body.

The village of Marlton, near Mt.
Holly, N. J., possesses a freak. On
Monday Mrs. Schaffner, the young and
pretty wife of a well-to-do farmer of the
village, gave birth to a healthy male
infant without eyes, but with a pair of
well-developed horns just above where
the eyes ought to be. Otherwise the
infant was perfect and bids fair to live.
Mrs. Schaffner some time ago was chas-
ed by a vicious bull, and narrowly es-
caped being gored by the beast.
