The Belmont Gold Mine.

Reports from the Belmont gold mine are of the most encouraging nature. Forty men are now working night and day. The shaft has been sunk a distance of 60 feet and the ore is panning out \$18 to the ton, which is a very high average. On Tuesday of last week the first Crawford reducing mills which have come to Canada arrived at Belleville, and will be sent out to Belmont and put into operation at once. The machinery was bought from Roby & Co., of Lincoln, England, and was patented in June last. By these mills the ore is reduced by a chemical process. Workmen are busily engaged in erecting steam and electric drills and steam hoists at the mines. The celebrated Gate's ore breakers are put in. Telephone connection has been made with Marora. T. P. Pearce, an extensive miner and capitalist of North Hastings, has granted the company free water power. Millions of capital, both in England and the United States, are anxiously waiting further developments, before stepping in and opening out this mine on an extensive scale. From present indications there is no reason to doubt that Belmont has a good sized gold mine on its hands and will yet turn out to be one of the biggest mines in America. Samples are shipped daily to New York and have created considerable attention on Wall street. —*Norwood Register.*
