Wants Cash From Sage.

LAIDLAW SAYS THE MILLIONAIRE USED-HIM AS A SHIELD.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Preliminary steps have been taken by W. R. Laidlaw, a broker's clerk, for \$100,000 damagec in a suit against Russell Sage for using him (Laidlaw) as a shield to save himself when Norcross exploded the bomb in Sage's office on December 4. The suit will be based upon the allegation that Sage deliberately held Laidlaw between himself and the menacing dynamiter, with the result that Sage's life was saved at the expense of terrible injuries to Mr. Laidlaw. Mr. Laidlaw is still an inmate of St. Vincent's Hospital, and it will be weeks before he can leave for home. In an interview with Mr. Laidlaw to-day he said: "No one who knows Mr. Sage can doubt that he delibcrately drew me in front of him. My mind is perfectly clear on that point because, being uncousious of danger, I was not excited and remember distinctly the occurrence before the explosion.

Indeed a Disgrace.

A LONDON EVICTION ATTENDED WITH MUCH REVOLTING CRUELTY.

LONDON, Dec. 26 .- A block of squalid buildings in Leather-lane, in the Holborn district, was recently condemned, and the time given for the people inhabiting the block to leave their dwellings expired last night. Some of them had already left, but 48 families, comprising 130 persons, lingered in the hopes that they would not be dispossesed. But as soon as the legal limit of time had expired, officers began the eviction of the tenants, and the furniture was thrown into the roadway. The tenants were warned not to return to the tenaments, and the doors were locked. The scene in the street was distressing. Women and children, scantily clad, stood about, crying piteously, their faces blue and pinched and their forms shivering. Some tradesmen in the vicinity took pity on the unfortunates and furnished a quantity of coke. Fires were started in the street, and about the welcome piles of glowing coke the women and children crouched, thankful for even this small blessing. It was believed that the tenants might resist their eviction and a strong force of police was present and prevented any disturbance. The evicted people were compelled to remain in the street all night. There is general indignation expressed that the tenants should have been eviced during such an. inclement season.

A Calamity at Gateshead.

TERRIBLE RESULTS FROM A CRY OF

London, Dec. 27 .- A theatre in Gateshead near Durham, was last night the scene of a fearful panic, in which, according to the reports received here, at least ten persons, including nine children, were killed outright and many were injured. The sight of the slight. blaze caused by a man in the audience dropping a lighted match on the sawdust covered floor caused someone tostart the cry of "fire," and a terrible panie at once ensued. There was immediatly a wild rush for the doors, which, owing to the savage crush and struggle, quickly became so locked that only a few succeeded at once in getting: out. There was a specially violent rush for the staircase leading from the gallery. The passage giving access to this staircase became blocked almost at once with persons who were striving their utmost. to escape, while the staircase itself was filled with a struggling mass of humanity from the top leading all the way to the outlet. A check taker was killed in " the midst of his heroic efforts to save other lives. In trying to restrain the crowd in its mad behavior he was thrown to the floor and crushed to death beneath the feet of the panic-stricken people.

A blizzard prevailed throughout Nobraska, Kansas, Wyoming, Colora lo and the Dakotas on Christmas Day. Heavy losses of stock and great interruption of traffic resulted.
