A COLD NIGHT.—Last Tuesday night was the coldest this winter, and next morning at 7 o'clock a good Methodist thermometer, that couldn't be bribed to tell a fib, said the temperature was 22 degrees below zero. Jack Frost has been very forebearing so far, but we have had two or three cold snaps, though of only very brief duration, and we shall probably have two or three more.

TEA AT BADDOW.—The annual Baptist tea Baddow was held on Tuesday night, and about 25 persons from Fenelon Falls, including the choir of the Baptist church, were present. Owing to sickness in the vicinity of Baddow and the extreme severity of the cold, the attendance was not quite as large as usual; but, notwithstanding the drawbacks mentioned, there was a good crowd, and the tea was a success financially as well as otherwise.

THE GALWAY LEAD MINE.—The *Buckeye Independent* says: Among the most interesting mining items of the week is a report operations at the Galway lead mine will be re-opened on the 20th January, when steam machinery will drive a shaft down some 500 feet. It is also stated that a vein four feet wide of tin ore has been found, that runs through lots 16, 17, 18 and 19 in concession A of Galway, and this vein, it is said, will be opened in the spring. If this should turn out well it would be a most valuable find.

The Duke's Career.

Prince Albert Victor, first Duke of Clarence and Avondale, was the eldest son of the Prince of Wales, and was born on January 8, 1864. He was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge, and at the University of Heidelberg. Before entering as an under-graduate, however, he had passed two years as a naval cadet on board the *Britannia*, and in 1879 started with his brother George on a voyage around the world in the *Bacchante*, returning to England in 1882. On leaving the university he proceeded to Aldershot to prepare for the army. In 1883 he was invested with the order of the Garter. In 1887 in company with his brother he visited Ireland, and in 1889 and 1890 spent some months in India, returning in the spring of the latter year and taking his seat in the House of Lords. On December 15, 1890, he was installed as a right worshipful grand master of the Masonic order for the Province of Berkshire at Reading, and during 1891 he did military duty in Ireland. Not long ago he was betrothed to Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, his second cousin, and the announcement was received with considerable satisfaction by the people of Great Britain generally.

The funeral of the late Prince Albert Victor took place on Wednesday.

"Col." Pickett Nelson, colored, "the tallest man on earth," died of typhoid fever at Baltimore on Tuesday, aged 31. He was eight feet one inch tall and weighed 337 pounds.
