The Duke's Career.

Prince Albert Victor, first Duke of Clarence and Avondale, was the eldest son of the Prince of Wales, and was born on January 8, 1864. He was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge, and at the University of Heidelberg. Before entering as an under-graduate however, he had passed two years as a naval cadet on board the Brittania, and in 1879 started with his brother George on a voyage around the world in the Bacchante, returning to England in 1882. On leaving the university he proceeded to Aldershot to prepare for the army. In 1883 he was invested with the order of the Garter. In 1887 in company with his brother he visited Ireland, and in 1889 and 1890 spent some months in India, returning in the spring of the latter year and taking his seat in the House of Lords. On December 15, 1800, he was installed as a right worshipful grand master of the Masonie order for the Province of Berkshire at Reading, and during 1891 he did military duty in Ireland. Not long ago he was betrothed to Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, his second cousin, and the annonnecment was received with considerable sati-faction by the people of Great Britain generally.

The funeral of the late Prince Albert Victor took place on Wednesday.

"Col." Picket Nelson, colored, "the tailest man on earth." died of typhoid fever at Biltimore on Tuesday, aged 31. He was eight feet one inch tall and weighed 387 pounds.
