A Dead Man at the Throttle.

CLAYTON, Ill., Jan. 25.—Considerable comment has been caused in railroad circles here over the statement by fireman Edward Warber, who was on the ill-fated westbound Wabash "Canonball" express that dashed into the eastbound express at Aladdin, near East Hannibal, about a week ago. Engineer Burchard of that train was killed, and all the railroad men wondered how so careful a man as he could have run by the switch in the fog as he did. Warber, who is recovering from hurts in the wreck, says that Burchard was undoubtedly dead in the cab before reaching the switch, having died of heart disease soon after leaving Hull. This Warber now believes, as Burchard did not take his head from the window once after leaving Hull. Railroad men generally credit the story.

A man giving the name of Hy. G. Dowd was captured by the New York police early Sunday morning in the act of cutting a man's throat. Dowd has for a few days been following up drunken men, and when he got them in a lonely spot would pounce upon them and cut their throat with a razor. The man is looked upon as a maniac. His victims so far number five.

A Mexican named Juan Lopez, living on a ranch north-west of Silver City, N. M., four years ago caught a young mountain lion and raised it as a pet. He had the animal completely under subjugation and it was docile with him as a house cat. Lopez was recently married and the lion took a dislike to his wife. During the man's absence last week the animal attacked Mrs. Lopez and tore her to pieces. He then fled to the mountains. Lopez has become insane with grief.
