## The Mule, the Farmer and the Monopolist.

The mule is stronger than the man. Though the mule is stronger than the man, the man manages the mule for his own purposes. He puts a bridle on him and a saddle and rides on his back. He puts harness made of leather on the mule, and by speaking to him and giving him plenty of licks, induces him to walk and pull a waggon, while the man gets into the waggon and rides. The mule does the hard work, but all the money gained by the mule's hard work the man appropriates to himself. ## The Provincial Estimates.

The same regard for economy which marked the Provincial expenditure of 1891 appears to have governed the preparation of the estimates for 1892. A little more will be spent on the ordinary services this year than last, but a good deal less is set apart for capital account, the result being that the total outgo, if the estimate is realized, will be over half a million less than in 1891. For expenses connected with popular education an increase of \$10,000 is provided for; immigration goes up by a little over \$3,000; in the agricultural department an addition of \$14,000 is asked—\$8,700 is for the extra assistance promised the local agricultural societies; and for hospitals and charities, provision is made for \$17,000 over and above the expenditure of the year gone by. These figures all indicate careful pruning, and show that there is little to be gained by the Opposition in criticizing the financial record of the Government. Some other ground of attack will have to be found if success is to be hoped for.—*Toronto (Tory) News.*

## The Force of Imagination.

A terrible accident occurred the other day in the woods, on a farm near Canton. A man was chopping, when the axe came in contact with his boot. The poor fellow fainted away, his foot was wrapped up, the man laid on a sleigh and a man was sent post-haste to town for a surgeon, who with fast driving arrived at the place where the accident occurred. The boot was carefully removed by the doctor, when lo and behold there was not a single scratch to be seen. The poor boot was the only thing that had been hurt. This reminds one of what occurred on the street here some years ago, when one of our town ruffians was stabbed on the street by a Salvation Army man, "the child of a king," as he called himself. He was carried very carefully into Dr. Salter's office, saying, "Give me a drink of water, I am nearly gone. Oh! I am dying! Quick, doctor." On examination there was not a scratch, even the clothing had not been cut.—*Port Hope Guide.*

A negro culprit was burned at the stake by an Arkansas mob on Saturday in the presence of 6,000 people.

The foot and mouth disease has spread to 16 districts in Schleswig-Holstein. It is presumed the disease was propagated by manure.

Three families of 28 persons have been poisoned at Mount Chase, Maine, probably by the use of cooking soda, which had been kept a long time in a box. One death ensued and others are seriously ill.
