Wood Ashes, Alsike and Red Clover.

To the editor of THE EMPIRE.

SIR.—We ship yearly to the States from 1,000 to 2,000 cars of ashes. We ship yearly to Great Britain and the continent alsike and red clover to the value of something like the value of \$1,000,000 I would very much like to draw the attention of your readers who grow alsike and red clover to the very great importance of giving their land all the wood ashes they can lay their hands on, that is, to lands they now have in clover and alsike, or are putting into clover and alsike. Clover and alsike especially need potash, and wood ashes is one of the cheapest forms in which potash can be bought. Farmers should never sell or trade off a pound of wood ashes. You have so many readers amongst the farmer community who do not see or read the agricultural papers, that I believe if you will insert this letter or draw the attention of the farmers to the importance of using all the wood ashes they can get hold of from their neighbors or the towns and villages, you will be very greatly benefiting this province of Ontario. As alsike and red clover get their nitrogen from the air, it is a waste of money to give it to them in the form of fertilizers, but they need potash, and, if potash is given to these plants, it makes them stronger and so much more able to draw more and more nitrogen from the air. The land is greatly enriched with the nitrogen that is left in the soil, that is, from the roots, stalks and stems which remain or are ploughed in, the following crops of wheat, barley, etc., of course getting the benefit. Peas, beans, lucerne will be as greatly benefited as alsike and red clover. Please use your influence to stop the leak of wood ashes. Yours, etc.,

### An Indian Fat Woman.

Mrs. Chippewa, the largest woman in the world, died on February 2nd at Dog Lake, an Indian reservation on the shores of Lake Manitoba, distant from Winnipeg a little over 100 miles. The avoirdupois of the deceased was phenomenal. She tipped the scales at over 700 pounds a few days before she died. The cause of death, though an autopsy has not been made, was undoubtedly due to fatty degeneration of the heart. The woman was born 47 ago years on the shores of Hudson Bay. She moved to Lake Manitoba district with her parents seventeen years ago, where she has since resided, excepting a few weeks spent in Winnipeg museum six years ago. At that time she weighed 624 pounds. She was five feet eleven inches in height, and a full-blooded squaw. After death the body was placed in a coffin seven feet long and five feet across. The woman was married to an Indian weighing less than 100 pounds. Mr. Fred Burrows, of this city, had arranged to take her to the World's Fair at Chicago in 1892.

### The Great City.

Walter Besant, in the March number of Harper's Magazine, concluding his very popular series of articles on London says: "We have seen London from age to age. It has changed indeed. Yet in one thing it has shown no change. London has always been a city looking forward, pressing forward, fighting for the future, trampling on the past. As it has been so it is, the city may have reached its highest point; it may be about to decline; as yet it shows no sign; it has sounded no note of decay or of decline or of growing age. The city which began with the East Saxon settlement among the forsaken streets thirteen hundred years ago is in the full strength and lustiness of manhood. For which, as in private duty bound, let us praise and magnify the providence which has so guided the steps of the citizen, and so filled their hearts with the spirit of self-reliance, hope and courage.

The Neah Indians, who are the most expert seal hunters in the world, have struck for an advance of wages. The Indians have refused to ship in several of the schooners which have started from Seattle towards the north. The red men think that on account of the high prices paid for the skins last year the owners of the vessels will make a good deal of money this year, and should accordingly give the crew a larger share of the catch. Thus far the captains have not yielded to the demands, but have shipped white crews.
