## A Big Find.

The rather ancient and not undistinguished village of Lyme, Connecticut, now rejoices in the separation of a big pecuniary find in one of her suburban homes—the Kingsbury estate. Sixty thousand dollars in cash and \$30,000 in securities are said to be the amount thus unearthed. What makes this discovery still more of an incentive to the romancer is that the Kingsbury family is an old and noted one—the late Major Kingsbury in his day having been something of a warrior, and his son, Major Henry Kingsbury of the Eleventh Connecticut, having fallen at the battle of Antietam, while his daughter lived to marry the well-known General Simon B. ## Imparative.

A change in the commercial policy of Canada is undoubtedly becoming imparative. The country is not making progress, but is rather retrograding. The efforts to increase population by immigration have amounted to nothing, for the reason that there is a constant drain from the native population of people who come to the United States. Deprived of the markets of this country farming has become unprofitable, and with nothing but the home market manufacturing does not prosper. Efforts to extend the foreign trade have brought no practical results. The situation is growing harder and more distressing, but still the Government will consider no remedy that involves discrimination against English interests. No radical change is to be expected until the Liberal party is restored to power.—*Omaha Bee.*

## Electric Smash.

There was considerable hard driving and a large amount of loud talking and yelling on Walton street some time before the middle of Saturday night, which was not by any means soothing to those trying to sleep. Two young men, Sam Smith and J. Rowe, happened to drive down as an Electric Light Co's employee lowered the electric lamp at the corner of Queen and Walton streets to re-carbon it for the remainder of the night. The young man yelled to warn the men, but Rowe, who was driving, did not stop but drove his horse full speed into the dangling wires, which caught the animal under the neck and threw it. The effect on the electric plant was somewhat demoralizing—the manager says to the extent of \$50—the lamp was smashed and the stays on the roof of the American H. L. were pulled off. The only surprising thing is that no one was killed from the electric current, which was full on at the time, otherwise we might have a "shocking accident" to record.—*Port Hope Guide.*

A terrible tragedy occurred at the pulp mill at Chatham on Friday morning. Gustav Anderson was sent into the blow-off tank of one of the digesters (boilers in which the pulp is cooked in a chemical solution) and Stephen McDonald, who was sent to turn steam into another digester, blunderingly opened the blow-off valve of the one connected with the tank in which Anderson was working. The boiling pulp and acid burst in on him under a pressure of 70 pounds of steam and at a temperature of 230 degrees, choking and cooking the life out of him instantly.
