A farmer from near Gananoque went to New York to get \$3,400 left him by a relative. He became the fast friend of a sharper, who drew the money and packed it in a tin box for the farmer. When the latter got home he found the box full of rags.

The past year has been one of the worst business years ever known in Saxony. Over 40,000 distress warrants were issued in Dresden alone, an increase of nearly 20 per cent., and the number of bailiffs has had to be considerably augmented.

A boy 10 years old, son of John Gilman, of Pickering, got his arm caught in a planing machine on Saturday. The arm was drawn into the planer knives and torn into shreds to the elbow. A doctor was immediately called. The little fellow seems to be doing fairly well.

The Earl of Rosse's famous American aloe, which, on completing the hundred year of its existence last August, suddenly bloomed into flower and rose to a height of twenty-three feet, has now further verified the tradition of its species by dying and leaving seedlings springing up at its base.

When Herbert Sprague of Bangor went to bed the other night he carried to his room a bull terrier pup. At midnight Sprague snored, and the dog scratched his face to awake him. Sprague cuffed the dog, whereupon the animal, with true terrier instinct, seized his master by the nose and shook him as he would a rat. The dog is dead now, and Sprague's nose has lost much of its beauty.

Frank Farlow, of Saginaw, Mich., and Miss Rebecca Bundy, of Big Rapids, were married in Detroit on the 5th inst., and the remarkable part of the exhibition lies in the fact that they are the two fattest people in America. She is 19 years of age and weighs 596 pounds, but large though her weight may be, it pales into insignificance beside that of her husband, who turns the scale at 762 pounds.

The attempt of the State of Illinois to exterminate the English sparrow seems to be more expensive than successful. In three months 450,000 sparrows have been killed at 2 cents a head, but the number of the living sparrows remains as large as ever. On the other hand, inexperienced marksmen are making life dangerous to a large part of the people of Illinois. The English sparrow will not go.

An old negro woman living on the outskirts of Columbia, S. C., missed a chicken or two from her henery every morning for some time. She tried various ways to stop the thievery, but in vain. Finally she bought and fed to some old hens some poison which would fatten them to a desirable point, but prove certain death to anyone who ate them. One negro in the neighborhood soon sickened and died. Shortly afterwards two or three others followed. Chicken stealing in that neighborhood has ceased.

Dr. Krug, a German scientist, claims that he has discovered how to make an edible and nutritious cake out of wood. His method consists of transforming the cellulose into grape sugar, a substance admissible by the animal organism. The biscuit is made by adding to this about 40 per cent. of meal of wheat, oats or rye. Phosphates and all the bone elements may also be introduced. This bread of wood-glucose is intended to be fed to cattle, for which it will take the place of oil cakes and other feeds composed of industrial wastes.

The steamship Monowai arrived at San Francisco on Saturday from Sydney, N. S. W., brought news that at Taurang, Auckland, on Feb. 8 Duncan Munroe, a stepson of the late mayor of the town, and who had been afflicted with religious mania for some time, only recently having been released from an asylum, called at the house of his family. Next morning a milkman found the wife and family dying, their brains having been battered out with a flat iron and rolling pin. Munroe was found on the beach back of the house stark naked.
