At a public ball given near Honesdale, Pa., where the entire neighborhood participated, no fewer than 43 babies could be seen sleeping together, huddled in the corner of the room, placed there by their mothers bent on the pleasures of the night.

Patrick Doyle, a desperado who has killed seven men in ten years, was killed by his nine-year-old son at his ranch near Muddy, Mont. The father was chopping wood when the boy came out of the house with a rifle, and, taking deliberate aim, fired the fatal shot.

One of the ladies caught in the New York hotel fire had presence of mind enough to wrap a wet towel over her head and face to prevent being suffocated with the smoke. By this means she was able to remain at a window till she gained the attention of those outside. The wet towel saved her life.

The wonderful growth in the beet sugar industry is shown by the following statistics: In 1887 there was only one such refinery in the United States. This produced 400,000 pounds of sugar. In 1888 the total output was 3,600,000 pounds, while in 1891 California produced 13,000,000 and Nebraska and Utah 6,000,000 pounds each.

Samuel Sells, a farmer aged 37, of Bloomington, Ill., while walking from his barn to his house, tripped and fell forward with great violence. A bar of rusty iron entered one of his eyes and pierced the brain to a depth of six inches. It required all his strength to pull the iron out. Sells recovered his senses next day, but one side is paralyzed. He cannot recover.

Great preparations are being made by exporters of fruit to receive and ship the largest crop of pine-apples ever sent from Havana, some people estimating that shipments will reach 200,000 barrels of from six to ten dozen pines in each barrel. The pines are classified as extra, Nos. 1, 2 and 3, and are shipped principally to New York, whence they are distributed all over the United States. A small quantity goes to New Orleans. The Cuban pine-apple cultivation is increasing every year, large tracts of the finest land within a radius of 15 and 20 miles of Havana being devoted to this industry. The weather continues good for sugar making, being cool and dry generally within the sugar zone, while heavy rains have fallen during the past week around Havana.

Daniel Lilly, who was reported to be 106 years old, died at Waterdown on March 27. His mind was bright and active to the hour of his death, but he had wasted away to a mere shadow. He was a tailor, and over 40 years ago he made clothes for little boys, who are now bearded men with families. For many years he was too feeble to do any work, and lived with his daughter at Waterdown. He was an Irishman by birth, and came to this country many years ago. A few years ago he walked from Freeton to Waterdown, a distance of 10 miles, to vote at a general election. One of deceased's peculiarities was a want of faith in bridges. He would neither ride nor walk over a bridge if he could help it, and it is said that rather than cross the bridge about two miles distant from Waterdown, he would walk down the gully and up the other side.

The presence of illicit stills in Montreal is causing a good deal of comment. A cone-shaped cyclone unroofed a number of houses and did other damage at Bloomington, Ill., on Saturday.
