

**SCHOOL BOARD.**—An irregular meeting of the school board was held last Monday evening, for the purpose of ordering payment of teachers' quarter's salaries and passing an account for wood and another for advertising the school auditors' report.

**CHILD HURT.**—On Tuesday last Mr. Wm. Waffle's little son, two years old, got possession of a boot-jack, which he either threw or dropped over the banisters, and it struck his sister, four years old, on the crown of her head, knocking her down and inflicting a wound which bled very freely, though fortunately it was not at all serious.

**RATS.**—Mr. Sandford was at Mr. Junkin's drug store on Wednesday morning to get something to kill the rats with which he says his mill is fairly swarming; and it was just the same at the North Star mill until the neighbors' cats began to prow around the premises, and say "you're my meat" to every rat that came within reach of their claws.

**JAMMED.**—Mr. Robert Jockett got his right hand jammed a few days ago between the wheel of a waggon and one of the sticks of wood with which it was laden, and Mr. Wm. Warren got his left hand caught between two sticks of timber while working at the new saw-mill just built by Mr. J. A. Ellis, and which will soon be ready to commence operations. Both injuries were severe and painful, but no bones were broken.

**THE CHEESE FACTORY.**—Mr. Sandford, of the Fenelon Falls cheese factory, has posted bills asking for tenders for drawing milk on the different routes, six in number, during the coming season, which will commence on the 9th of May if no cause of delay arise. The factory has been four years in operation, and by dint of good management and the employment of thoroughly competent cheese makers, has been fairly profitable to all concerned.

**JUST LIKE SAM.**—A resident of Ottawa, writing to a friend in Fenelon Falls, says: "I have been to the House of Commons, and heard Sam Hughes speak for two mortal hours. His speech was nothing but a rehash, and he didn't seem to know that nearly all the other members were laughing at him. A fellow sufferer said to me: 'Has that man got a mortgage on the House of Commons?' and to see his swagger you would think he owned half of Ottawa."

**NEARLY A RUNAWAY.**—On Tuesday afternoon, near the railway station, Mr. Nathan Day had a somewhat protracted struggle with a young mare, which took fright when the train came in and tried to run away. She upset the sulky to which she was hitched, and threw Mr. Day to the ground and jumped over him twice; but he hung to her head-gear right manfully and finally managed to soothe her fear. His neck was hurt during the "wrestle," but so slightly that it was nearly well when he came to the Falls next morning.

**BOARD OF HEALTH.**—On Wednesday evening the village Board of Health met, for the first time this year, in the office of the North Star Roller Mill, and Mr. James Dickson was elected chairman. Mrs. John Wallace having complained of the offensive smell of Messrs. Davis & Jockett's slaughter-house on Dean street, a motion was passed instructing Mr. P. Kelly, Sanitary Inspector, to inspect the building, and to have it removed if he found it within 200 yards of a dwelling-house or 70 yards of a street, the distances prescribed by law.

**A CLEVELAND BAY.**—Tuesday's afternoon train brought to Fenelon Falls a handsome Cleveland Bay stallion purchased from Mr. Wm. Row, breeder and importer, of Ingersoll, by Mr. Nathan Day, of Lakeview farm, Fenelon, who was waiting at the station to receive him. "Santa Claus," as he is named, weighs 1,260 lbs. though only three years old, and took four first prizes last fall. The Cleveland Bays are unsurpassed as carriage horses, for which purpose they have been bred for generations in the old country, and, being plenty strong enough for ordinary farm work, are rapidly coming into favor in the States and Canada. They are well-built, showy animals with fine action; in color a rich bay, with black legs, main and tail, and, sometimes, a little white on the feet and face. We wish Mr. Day luck with his new venture.

A post-mortem examination of the body of James Mason, who died a few days ago at Paisley, Ont., showed that death resulted from a plum stone, which had lodged in the bowels and must have been there for a long time, as it was in a partly decomposed state.

A special from Millersburg, Holmes County, Ohio, says a mob lynched an unknown negro, hanging him to a tree. He had been about the town a few weeks and had been ordered to leave. He had lingered about people's door-steps and annoyed them in various ways. There are supposed to be no negroes in Holmes County.

It is rumored that the Midland Railway may pass into the control of the C. P. R. on the expiration of the lease to the Grand Trunk, as the latter will not renew the lease.

An Australian agricultural paper makes note of an immense increase in the number of sheep in Australia in the last two or three years, and of the enormous development of the grazing capabilities of the country. The estimated number of sheep in Australia in 1892 is 60,000,000, against 31,000,000 in 1884.

The finding of 100 infernal machines and several dynamite cartridges in various parts of Paris on Saturday, evidently having been hastily thrown away, shows that the Anarchists are greatly alarmed at the rigorous detective inspections which are being made by the police, and have taken this means of putting out of their possession any articles which would incriminate them. The police are prosecuting their search in the strictest manner and are ransacking every hole and corner for explosives.

The British War Office is greatly agitated by the revelations in the case of Edward Holden, formerly of the Royal Engineers, who was arrested while endeavoring to ascertain facts relative to the defenses at Gibraltar. It is said that Holden had an agreement with the French war office to procure for them as far as possible the plans of all fortifications in the Mediterranean, and perhaps in adjoining waters. How far he had got in his work of treachery and espionage is not known, except that no doubt is entertained that he has sold a plan of the Malta and Gozo defenses to France. For this reason it has been determined to make important changes in the plans at Malta.
