#### Military Ballooning.

A new impetus to ballooning will doubtless result from the following successes of the Germans on the Russian frontier, given in reports telegraphed from St. Petersburg to the New York papers.

A few nights ago the inhabitants of Warsaw were startled by an intensely bright light that fell from the sky upon the city. All eyes were turned upward, but nothing could be seen save a path of light that ended in a small focus. Many people in their excitement thought it was a comet in close proximity to the earth, and were greatly frightened. Suddenly the ray of light swept in another direction, and when their eyes became accustomed to the darkness that followed, they could see far up in the sky a balloon. Then it dawned upon the people that it was an electric search light that had caused the brilliant illumination, and that the Germans were continuing their observations of the Russian defenses with its aid. The balloon remained over the city until 1 o'clock in the morning, when the light was extinguished, and the balloon, heading westward toward the frontier of Prussia, disappeared. Later another balloon was seen over the Proushik railway station. It remained stationary for a time, and then started in the direction of the fort works near Kelets, where it hovered awhile, when it returned across the frontier. Reports of similar occurrences have been received from Sosnovitz and other places along the frontier. The balloons came from Prussian Silesia in the night time and project the rays of powerful search lights in every direction. The balloons, which were at a great height, remained stationary sometimes for a space of 40 minutes, and would then proceed in any desired direction. There is no doubt that the steering apparatus, whatever it is, is admirably adapted for its purposes. For the balloons apparently answer to it as readily as does a vessel to her helm.

Russian officers hold that with manageable balloons the whole system of warfare will be changed. It is self-evident that none of the present fortifications would be able to withstand an attack from above them. Shells would be dropped with almost unerring certainty, and no city could defend itself from an enemy far up in the air beyond the reach of any missile. Even modern cannon, with their great range, could not at present be used against balloons, for the reason that gun carriages have not been made that will allow of a perpendicular elevation.—Scientific American.

#### Dynamite Experiments.

A departure in firing dynamite or other high explosives in a shell and from an ordinary gun has met with great success in Manchester, England. Mr J. E. Bott is the inventor. Instead of the cumbersome machinery necessary to furnish the compressed air to drive the projectile, Mr Bott supplies a shell containing highly compressed air in its rear portion. The gun used is a breech-loading smoothbore. When the shell is entered the action of firing forces a pin inward at the base of the shell, thus tearing a hole in the retaining valve and liberating the compressed air. This drives the shell from the gun with wonderful force. It does not heat the gun, makes scarcely any noise, produces no smoke and has a great range, and the absence of fouling enables it to be used continuously. Such a combination of valuable qualities would seem to revolutionize all previous work in ordnance and the study of smokeless powder.—New York Recorder.

#### The Gypsy Moth.

A year ago Massachusetts, for the benefit of its farmers, undertook to exterminate the gypsy moth. The process has been found a costly one. The first twelve months' campaign cost \$69,247 and gave employment to an army of two hundred and thirty men and thirty horse teams. Hogsheads of Paris green, water, pumps, hose, ladders and oil clothing, made up the equipment of the attacking force, and in the twenty municipalities that were gone over the estimate is made that 353,000,000 eggs were destroyed. It has been discovered that the pest is confined to a comparatively limited locality, and that it has been reduced in extent. Nevertheless, an appropriation of \$75,000 is asked for another year's work. It is a case of the moth or the people going.
