

Better Butter Wanted for the British Market.

OTTAWA, April 22.—At a meeting of the Committee of Agriculture and Colonization yesterday, Professor Robertson, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, gave evidence in regard to the season's work. Since his appointment two years ago, he said, there is a growing interest taken in dairying throughout the Dominion. Cheese has been sent from the stations at Perth and London, Ont., to England, and sold well. Referring to some experiment made in connection with feed, he showed that the milk could be altered in richness and color, but not in regard to solids. Farmers in the vicinity of Mount Elgin dairy station had received 15 cents monthly for their butter on account, and the butter on being sent to England and British Columbia had yielded them 24 and 25 cents net per pound. In the course of a few years he estimated that \$5,000,000 worth of butter might be sent to England. In the meantime England imported \$56,000,000 worth of butter, and 40 per cent. of this came from Denmark. The Danish butter realized 10s. more per 112 pounds than the Canadian article. Our butter was equal to the Danish in every respect, with the exception of the rosy appearance and flavor, which seemed to take better in the English market.

Give Them Every Attention.

The enormous rush of immigration to the Canadian prairies this spring is most encouraging. Those farmers' sons in Ontario who have not the means to purchase the high-priced farms in this Province are determined to go somewhere in search of cheaper land, and it is preferable that they should go to our own Northwest rather than Minnesota or Dakota. That better provision is not made for their reception on arriving in the West, and to assist them in finding suitable locations, is most discreditable to the Government. It is shameful that there should be only one land guide to a whole colony of settlers, and that proper shelter is not provided for the new arrivals, pending their permanent settlement. This is a case where economy in spending is worse than folly. The most liberal arrangement should be made looking towards the location of settlers. If this is not done, if a repetition of the scene witnessed at Elmon ton the other day is allowed, a serious check will be put upon a hopeful movement.—Toronto News.
