Anarchy's Outbreak.

FRANCE AROUSED TO THE NECESSITY OF
ACTION.

France has been stirred from end to
end by the Anarchistic outrages of the
past six weeks. Dynamite explosions
are of almost daily occurrence at the
houses of judges, magistrates and offi-
cials of all kinds, and at public buildings
which have the slightest possible con-
nection with constituted authorities.
Police guard the members of the magis-
tracy, and official Paris is swarming
with police in uniform and in citizens'
clothing.

In view of the threats against M.
Quesnay de Beaurepaire, the Public
Prosecutor, everybody who calls at his
house is attentively examined before he
is permitted to ascend the staircase.
Even the secretaries of some of the
judges d'instruction are applying for
protection for themselves and families.
A prominent Anarchist who does not
himself approve of the use of dynamite
is represented as having remarked that
more explosions were to be expected in
different countries. The party was car-
rying on its campaign against society
with more energy than ever. It is true
that individual members did not act
in obedience to orders received from
their leaders, but there was a kind of
instinct which drove them on to make
their power felt suddenly, and at the
same time in England, France, Ger-
many, Italy and Spain. It is supposed
that there are now in Paris from 30,000
to 40,000 men who are either active and
outspoken Anarchists or are secretly af-
filiated to the dangerous sect.

The general sentiment is that a state
of war virtually exists between society
and the Anarchists, and that the latter
must be crushed like venomous snakes.
Among the respectable classes fear and
apprehension have given way to an angry
and desperate feeling, and all declare
that no hesitation must be shown in
stamping out the murderous sect, cost
what it may.

That Ravachol and his companion es-
caped with life sentences shows the terror
in which the public stood. The jurymen
were all intelligent business men, and
that they allowed the fiends to escape
death proved the existence of general
terror. Then came the reaction, and
now all good citizens are awake to the
necessity of action.

Free Trade in Canada.

The free trade movement is advancing
in Canada. We referred last week to
the speech of D. C. Fraser, of the Do-
minion Commons, who, at a gathering
of Liberals at Hamilton, proposed abso-
lute free trade as the policy of the Lib-
eral party. When he said he was ready
to break down the Canadian tariff walls
and thus compel the United States to do
the same, his sentiments were loudly
cheered. This speech has been follow-
ed by an open letter from Senator Bou-
ton to Hon. Wilfred Laurier, in which
the Senator advocates free trade for
Canada and proposes the immediate
formation of a free trade league, predict-
ing that the policy can be established
within a decade. This movement is
more significant to us as a nation than
may at first blush appear. Mr. Fraser
indicated the way in which it is import-
ant when he said that the adoption of
free trade in Canada would force free
trade upon this country. If Canada
opens her ports her prosperity would go
forward in leaps and bounds. Despite
her natural disadvantages as compared
with ours, she would soon push us hard
for commercial supremacy on the Amer-
ican continent. American importing
interests would tend to concentrate at
her ports. In every trade with us,
whether she sold us her productions or
her importations, she would have an ad-
vantage. The trade would be more
profitable to her traders than to ours.
They would pay no duty on what they
took from our traders, while ours would
be heavily taxed for what they took from
hers. Canada would be the most profit-
able trading ground in North America;
and as trading breeds manufacturing,
she would be our most profitable man-
ufacturing country. If she continues
free trade and we protection, she would
become on this side of the ocean what
England is on the other—the commer-
cial nation of the continent. Nothing
could prevent it but the adoption of free
trade in the United States.—New York
Standard.
