The Majority a Source of Danger.

The Government at Ottawa has a
majority of sixty-two in a House of two
hundred and thirteen—almost two to
one. The disparity in the number of the
following behind the respective lead-
ers constitutes a serious menace to the
country. It is unwise to place unlim-
ited power—and the Abbott Ministry
practically has this for the time being—
in the hands of any man or set of men.
The truth of this general statement has
been proved in this particular instance.
The Ministry has become arrogant; it
has lost its keen regard for public opin-
ion and has forgotten all about recent
professions. Officials have been pen-
sioned or re-instated who should have
been dismissed or sent to jail; a Min-
ister has been allowed to retain his seat
in the Cabinet and to take his place in
the Commons whose sole title to office
and emolument are such as a partizan
judge, who has arrogated to himself the
place of a constituency, can give; and
inquiry into grave charges was at first
refused and then granted only because
of the significant warning given by the
County of Welland, and even then por-
tions of the charges were struck out of
the indictment. Another verdict or
two such as that given in Welland
would be in the interests of the country.
The balance between the parties would
be more evenly adjusted, and an addi-
tional spur given to urge the Govern-
ment back towards the straight path from
which it has recently been straying.

A Disastrous Fire in Peterborough.

Another disastrous fire has taken
place, this time in Ashburnham. The
Ontario Canoe Company's factory on
Elizabeth street was burned to the
ground this (Monday) morning at two
o'clock, and \$25,000 went up in smoke.
This makes the third great conflagration
which the firemen have had to battle
with during the last seven weeks. On
March 17th the moulder's department
of the Carbon Works was destroyed by
fire, and afterwards the large woolen
mills of Mann Bros., situated on the
river bank, met a like fate. The fire
was first discovered at a few minutes
before two o'clock this morning by Mr.
Sidney Martin, who resides on Mark
street in close proximity to the Ontario
Canoe Company's factory. He imme-
diately ran and aroused Mr. Samuel
Mulligan, who is employed in the factory,
and lives close by. Mr. Harry Morgan
who also works in the factory, and a
couple of other employees who reside in
the neighborhood, were the first to see
the flames and arrive on the scene. The
fire was first discovered in the room
where the shavings and other refuse
were kept. This room is in a lean-to
adjoining the engine room, on the south-
east side, and was soon in a mass of
flames.

The Ontario Canoe Company's factory
was a large plastered building, four
stories high. It was sixty-five feet long
by thirty feet wide, and sixty feet high.
It was built in the year 1884 and has
been used ever since for the manufacture
of canoes, which have been celebrated
all over the world. The company, from
the first day they established in business,
have always done a large and increasing
trade. The fire occurred at the worst
possible time, as the firm had in a large
stock of lumber and had received num-
bers of orders from all over the Dominion
for their famous canoes. The firm
also manufactured window sashes, doors,
blinds, etc., a large amount of planing
and such like work.

There was not a cent of insurance on
anything. The insurance companies
required a premium of 8½ and 9 per
cent., which Mr. Rogers was unable to
bear. He stated that the buildings and
contents had never been insured, and
that there was no truth in the rumour
that the insurance policies had run out
two weeks ago. Mr. Rogers said he
could not at present say whether the
company would rebuild or not, the loss
being so heavy.—Peterboro' Examiner.
