

**A Cow Killed.**—Last Saturday evening a cow owned by Mr. Edward Lansfield was run over and disembowelled by the train that had just left the Falls for Haliburton. The accident happened about half a mile north of the pulp mill, and the animal got on the track through a gap made in the fence (and not closed again) when Mr. John A. Ellis's ice house was pulled down a short time ago. On Sunday afternoon a great many of our villagers went to look at the victim; and the hair on the ends of a good many ties showed that she had been pushed or dragged a considerable distance before she rolled from the track.

Frederick Bailey Deeming, the wife murderer, is to be hanged at Melbourne on the 23rd inst.

The annual crop of English walnuts in Southern California reaches a million and a half pounds.

California now has six ostrich farms. This country spends about \$3,000,000 a year for ostrich feathers.

A man-eating shark, eighteen and a half feet long, with a head as big as a barrel, came ashore on the beach at Prescott, Me., recently. Its stomach contained a sheep and several dogfish.

A nice question in law has come up in Philadelphia, where a lady left \$1,000 in her will for the care and maintenance of her pet cat. The cat recently died, but left five little orphan kittens, and the question is whether they are the legal heirs of the pet cat.

The *Whitby Chronicle* says:—Mr. Samuel Dearborn, who resides about a mile and a half north of the town, actually shot a beaver, which was sitting on the sill of his cellar window, one day last week. The animal had dug a hole quite under the cellar wall, and had evidently lived about the premises for some time. Mrs. Dearborn had heard a noise as of something gnawing frequently. This appearance of a beaver is remarkable, for none have been seen about this locality for 40 years. There was one, however, in Lynde's creek, west of Whitby, about 10 years ago. Mr. Dearborn has preserved the hide.

According to Calgary papers the storm of last week was quite as severe in Alberta as in Manitoba. The MacLeod mail, which started from that town on Monday, had not yet been heard from on Saturday. The driver did not reach the first stopping place, which is 50 miles from MacLeod, and it is supposed that he has been lost on the prairie. Dr. Lovingheart and party, who left on April 18, for the Kuce Hill coal mines, 60 miles away, and who it was thought had perished in the storm on Monday last, were found by the mounted police yesterday. They had run out of provisions and were killing horses when found.
