Still Another Horror.

SCORES OF HUNGARIAN MINERS KILLED.
PESTH, May 14.—An immense water-spout burst in the neighborhood of the collieries situated in the city of Fuenkirehen, the capital of the County of Baranya. The huge column of water inundated the surrounding country and poured in great streams into the mines, flooding them in a very short time and causing terrible loss of life. The water poured into the mines so quickly that the unfortunate men who were engaged at work in the lower levels received no warning of their danger, and before they had a chance to escape they were struggling in the torrents which had almost instantaneously engulfed them. They struggled desperately to reach the shafts or any parts of the mines so quickly that likely to afford them a place of safety, but the water rapidly rose higher and higher, and in a short time every avenue of escape was shut off and the men perished miserably. The water did not reach to the upper levels, and the miners working in these portions of the mines made their way to the surface as quickly as possible.
Thousands of miners and others at once set to work to recover the bodies of the men in the flooded levels. Every pit was speedily surrounded by men, women and children, and heartrending scenes were witnessed as the bodies were brought up. It is known that 22 men are dead in one pit alone, and that many more have lost their lives in the other pits. Owing to the great excitement which prevails in the place, it is impossible at present to obtain an exact list of all the dead, but it will doubtless reach startling proportions.

The Langevin Boodle.
The Ottawa correspondent of the *Globe* says:—
The talk of the lobbies and corridors is the *Globe's* latest exposure of Sir Hector's official rank in the reptile fund organization. Many who had ceased to be surprised at anything in the line of corrupt practices at elections are astonished at the great amounts that are shown to have been spent on the contests in 1887, and the wholesale bribery that must have been carried on. The letters afford such a flat contradiction to the evidence given by Sir Hector before the Privileges and Elections Committee that suggestions of impeachment on the serious charge of perjury are frequently heard. With this comes a serious whisper from the quarters of the French Conservatives. Sir Hector has already submitted to the burden of the scapegoat with a docility that could scarcely be expected from a man of his solid determination and headstrong character. His forbearance has been heavily overstrained. Politically he has nothing to lose, and by exposing his partners in the long regime of corruption he could at least gain companionship, the one solace of the fallen. The alarming rumour is circulated about that he will not tamely submit to any greater degradation than he has already endured, and that, if any heavier retribution should fall on him, the colleagues who recently grew active in covering him with the consequences of their guilt will be made to bear the punishment of their own acts. The silence that has shielded his companions in the affair that has degraded him from the position of Cabinet Minister is liable at any time to be broken, and those who have been shielded by it, and to whom he certainly owes no good-will, may be exposed before the public in their true colors.

An Extraordinary Suicide.
MONTREAL, May 14.—In the parish of St. Antoine Abbe, County of Chateauguay, a young farmer committed suicide in an extraordinary manner. After working in a field for a time, he unharnessed his horses and led them to a large tree in the centre of the field. Around this tree he passed a stout cord. With one end he securely bound his feet and, lying down with his feet towards the tree, he made a slip noose on the other end, which he passed around his neck. He then fastened the slack of the cord to the tree, and, the preparations for suicide completed, he started the horses. Readers can imagine to themselves what happened. The unfortunate was strangled and almost decapitated. It was the father of the suicide who discovered the body of his son as he was returning from a neighboring wood.
