Bill Dampman, a miner in Idaho, missed a good deal of rich amalgam from his sluice boxes, and concluded to watch for the thief. He noticed a calf coming daily to drink from the box, shot the animal, and the supposed calf turned out to be a young woman.

Mr. Flamand, who has been studying the in-cubed stones in the southeastern part of Algeria, has found many rocks upon which men, women and children, who were evidently prehistoric, are represented. The designs bear considerable resemblance to Egyptian figures.

Of late years no human being has so startled the civilized world as has the Brother Tovei, known as "the two-headed boy." This extraordinary freak of nature is perfect in limb, symmetrical in form, bright, rosy cheeked and intelligent. Upon the one body are two heads and four arms.

A despatch from Redding, Cal., tells of the robbery of the Redding and Shasta stage by two masked robbers, who, after shooting the express messenger, driver and a passenger, secured the Wells-Fargo box containing \$20,000 and escaped. The express messenger, who has died, shot and wounded one of the robbers.

The National Zeitung publishes a despatch from St. Petersburg saying that the Russian police, acting on a warning from the police of Paris, have discovered a number of mines under the Gatchina Palace, the mines extend for a distance of several kilometers around the palace. The Russian Government has tried to wash up the fact of the discovery. The populace of St. Petersburg are terrorized.

A fine geological specimen of fossil tracks was found a few days ago in Brainerd's quarry, in Portland at a depth of 130 feet below the surface. The stone is about two and a half feet long by two feet wide and three-quarters of an inch thick. On the upper side, as the stone lay when found, there are eight tracks, evidently made by some animal about the size of a large dog. They are absolutely perfect in shape, representing the toes and the ball of the foot.

The protection which British juries afford to men who abuse their wives is extraordinary, and this a striking case: At Leeds a man named Knight, whose wife had deserted him on account of his violence and intemperance, went to see her to ask her to return home, and because she refused he fired three shots at her, hitting her each time, wounding her in the arm, back and ear. The jury found that the prisoner fired only with the intent to "frighten his wife," and the man had to be discharged.

A young man named John Modlin, living on Margaret street, Hamilton, about two years ago swallowed a brass-headed tack. Until recently he tried every means possible to get rid of the unpleasant morsel. Several doctors tried their skill, but the tack still remained in the young man's stomach. Frequently Modlin was taken ill with violent vomiting, and he wasted to a shadow. A few days ago a friend induced Modlin to take some patent medicine. He did so and it induced violent vomiting, during which the brass-headed tack was ejected from the stomach. The head of the tack was black and the point was quite soft. Modlin since then has felt much better.

A correspondent of the Montreal Witness says that one of the causes for the exodus of the French-Canadians from Quebec is found in the exactions of the Catholic clergy. As instances of the extent of these exactions two cases are cited—the erection of a church costing \$100,000 at the expense of a poor parish, and the building of another, almost as expensive, in a still poorer parish, to replace a structure that cost \$75,000 and which was recently burned down. The right to collect church rates by process of law, for the building of unnecessary expensive convents and church edifices, is doing more to depopulate Quebec than trade restrictions by a great deal.

Deeming the wife murderer, has bequeathed all his property to his lawyer except one-tenth, which goes to Miss Roswell, to whom he was engaged when arrested.

Two trains came together at full speed on Monday at Cleves, Ohio, on the Big Four line. The wreck was appalling, and not a passenger escaped without injury. Five bodies had been taken from the wreck when the latest despatch was sent.
