Fenelon Falls Court of Revision.

Fenelon Falls, June 1st, 1892.

The council met as Court of Revision at one o'clock p. m. Members present, John A. Ellis, reeve, and councillors Graham, McKeown and Austin. After taking the necessary declaration of office it was

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded by Dr. Graham, That J. A. Ellis act as chairman for the said court.—Car'd.

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded by H. H. Graham, That the following changes be made in the assessment roll, viz: That Geo. E. Martin's assessment on sundry lots south of river be reduced to \$400; and that the assessment on S. Newman's store (section 1 of one west of Colborne south of Bond) be reduced to \$400; that Martin Haskill be struck off lot No. 3 south of Louisa and assessed for lot 14 north of Louisa as tenant, and J. H. Brandon as owner; that Jas. Chambers's name be struck off lot 14, north of Louisa, and he be assessed for lot 12 north of Louisa as tenant, instead of Jas. McNeil, who has left the town; that the assessment of J. H. Brandon as owner of lot 14 north of Louisa be reduced to \$400; that the orange hall be assessed to Thos. H. Roberts instead of Wm. McKeown; that the name of Sam Hutchison be struck off east part 94 south of river as tenant, having left the town; that Geo. Raper be assessed for the McArthur House, described as lots 5 west of Colborne south of Francis and 4 west of Colborne south of Francis, rooms upstairs, and lots 2 and 3 east of May, and that Noble Ingram's name be struck off; that Thos. Austin's assessment on the east half 5, south of Louisa, be raised \$50.—Carried.

Moved by Thos. Austin, seconded by Dr. H. H. Graham, That the assessment roll as now revised be adopted, and that this Court of Revision be dissolved.—Carried.

Village Council Proceedings.

Fenelon Falls, June 6th, 1892.

The council met at regular meeting. Members present, the reeve, Messrs. McKeown, Austin, Graham and Robson. The minutes of last regular meeting and Court of Revision were read and confirmed.

Moved by Dr. Graham, seconded by Mr. McKeown, That the following accounts be paid and the reeve give his orders for same:—John S. Campbell, postage and stationery, \$1 75; D. Do., salary for assessing the village, \$30; David Varco, work on side walks, \$28 95; Wm. McIntosh, do. do., \$29; E. D. Hand, advertising Court of Revision, \$2; S. Nevison, salary, \$17; Michael Fritz of Friedensburg, the oldest man in Schuylkill County, Pa., is exciting a great deal of comment. He has had three sets of teeth and is likely to get a fourth. Four teeth have already grown, and there is reason to believe a full set will make their appearance.

So great has been the development of the petroleum fields in Peru that pipe lines have been run from the main wells to the coast. The opinion is that the Peruvian field will soon be able to supply the demand of all the west coast of South America.

Titusville and Oil City, Pa., were visited by cloudbursts on Sunday morning. Several oil refineries were struck by lightning, and the blazing oil floated on the surface of the water, setting fire to hundreds of houses. At 7 o'clock at night it was estimated that nearly 150 lives were lost in the two towns. At Titusville 700 people are out of house and home, and the property loss is a million dollars. At Oil City 750 are homeless and the property loss is a million and a half.

A costly wardrobe is owned by one of the Chinese ministers, whose magnificent and varied toilets have driven the society bodies wild with envy. The celestial dignitary never appears at public entertainments twice in the same costume, and his silk and satin garments are valued at £30,000.

A cow belonging to Levi Mogg, of Lydlich, Dorset, was observed a few days ago to be in great agony, and eventually dashed its head against the walls of its shed, breaking its neck. On examination a live snake, two feet long, and six young ones, also two water mews (*Triton Cristatus*) were found in its throat. It is supposed that the animal swallowed the reptiles while drinking from a tarn.

Mrs. Annie Deyman, interest on note, \$28; E. Lansfield, for carting plank, \$1 50.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded by Mr. Robson, That Mr. Ed. Lansfield be paid one dollar and seventy-five cents for lot returned to the county in error.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Graham, seconded by Mr. McKeown, That the clerk render an account of rents for the past nine years on market square and Water street as per agreements; also the full amount of rebate on taxes on market square for same period to Napance Paper Company.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Dr. Graham, That no order for accounts be given by any member or committee at any time except at regular meetings of the council; that no orders given at irregular times must be accepted by the clerk.—Carried.

Mr. Thos. Austin gives notice that at this meeting of council he will introduce a by-law to appoint a pound keeper.

Moved by Thos. Austin, seconded by Wm. McKeown, That by law No. —, entitled a by-law to appoint a pound-keeper for the village of Fenelon Falls, be now introduced and read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded by Mr. Robson, That Ed. Lausfield be appointed pound-keeper.—Carried.

By-law read a second time in committee of the whole without amendments, Mr. Austin in the chair.

By-law read a third time and passed. Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Robson, That the constable be instructed to collect all poll tax and billiard and pool table licenses in the village of Fenelon Falls.—Carried.

The council then adjourned.

Nathan John, a farmer, while ploughing in his field at Canton, Miss., on Tuesday, was killed by hailstones. Fruit and other crops suffered seriously.
