Credit Valley stock farm in the county of Peel. The Holsteins are very large cattle, in color black and white, and are said to be equally good for beef, milk and butter. In the stable at Twomey's hotel you can see a piebald heifer calf from "Orchardside King" that looks like a thorough-bred, though its mother, a roan cow, can probably boast of as many kinds of ancestors as a "yaller dog"—or Sam Hughes.

VISITORS.—Our picturesque village is likely to be thronged with visitors on Monday, the 18th of July, a poster we have received from the office of the Orillia Packet announcing that on that day the Sons of England will hold their annual excursion, which this year will be by rail to Lindsay and by the steamer *Crandell* to Sturgeon Point and Fenelon Falls. As they will come from all points this side of Midland there will probably be a big crowd, and it is to be hoped that they will be favoured with fine weather and so enjoy the trip that they will come over the same route next year.

SIDEWALKS.—The sidewalk on the south side of Francis street west from Mr. McKeown's furniture factory to Colborne street—which is very difficult to keep in order—is getting shaky again and wants a few props under it, and there is a ghastly hole in the sidewalk on Francis street east, where Mr. Golden has been drawing over it heavy loads of stone for the foundation of his house. There are probably others that want "fixing" also, and all of them, wherever they are, should be attended to at once, as the corporation will be responsible if accidents occur in consequence of their being out of repair.

THE BIGGEST YET.—Mr. Wm. O'Brien, of Francis street east, who works at fishing during the open season, and finds it a light, pleasant and fairly remunerative occupation, went down the river about half past 9 on Wednesday morning and returned at noon, bringing with him by far the biggest lunge seen in the village this season. A dozen guesses as to its weight were made, ranging all the way from 17 to 23 pounds, the lowest being about as far astray as the highest, for when put on the platform scale in McDougall and Brandon's store it was found to weigh not quite 20½ pounds. He says that it fought desperately, but after a struggle of about twenty minutes he towed it to shore and knocked it on the head before he drew it out of the water.
