Village Council.

Fenelon Falls, July 4th, 1892.

The council met pursuant to adjourn-
ment, members present, the reeve and
Messrs Austin, McKeown and Robson.
The minutes of the last meeting read
and confirmed.

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded
by Mr. Austin, That the following ac-
counts be paid and the reeve give his
orders for the same:—Chas. Wise, for
cutting brush on Lindsay street, \$3 00,
John McGee, cutting weeds on streets,
\$3 50, D. Varco, work on streets and
sidewalks, \$2 19, Wm. McIntosh, do.
do. do., \$2 19, P. Kelly, as sanitary in-
spector, \$24 00, S. Nevison, salary to
date, \$14 00, Assessor and Clerk, for
equalizing union school No. 3 assessment,
\$4 00.—Carried.

Mr. Jeremiah Twomey was heard in
reference to opening up Dean street and
digging a drain from his stable along
Bond street to the creek. The council
promised to give the matter their im-
mediate attention.

The sanitary inspector (Mr. Patrick
Kelly) reported on the sanitary condition
of the town, in which he stated that all
had complied carefully with the sanitary
conditions of the law, as enforced by him,
and that the town was now in a highly
satisfactory sanitary condition.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn
to meet next regular meeting in August.
—Carried.

Somerville Council Proceedings.

Burnt River, July 9th, 1892.

Council met pursuant to adjournment;
all the members present, the reeve in
the chair. The minutes of last meeting
were read and confirmed.

The following communications were
read and laid before the council: From
J. H. Harvey re exemption from taxation
on roller mill at Cobocook, laid over for
further information; from Messrs. Mc-
Sweyn and Anderson re account; from
Robert Jackett, requesting to be allowed
to do his statute per lot 3 con. 12, re-
quest not granted as the labor is needed
on 3rd concession; from Messrs. Moore
& Jackson re dividend from Hudspeth's
estate.

Moved by Mr. Morrison, seconded by
Mr. Burchall, That By law No. 362, a
by-law to establish a line of road across
lots 6 and D in concession A in Somer-
ville be now read a first time.—Carried.

By-law read and ordered to be read
and finally passed on the 24th day of
August next.

Moved by Mr. Howie, seconded by
Mr. Wilson, That By law No. 363, a
by-law to open part of Hunter street in
the village of Kinnmount be read a first
time.—Carried.

By-law read and ordered to be read
and finally passed on the 24th day of
August next.

Moved by Mr. Howie, seconded by
Mr. Burchall, That the following ac-
counts be paid, and orders granted on
the treasurer:—Thos. Robson, 3 steel
scrapers \$27; McSweyn & Anderson,
law costs, \$6; and that R. S. Frost, be
allowed ten dollars on his account for
medical services to H. Braddon and
the family of Jos. Horton.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Howie, seconded by
Mr. Burchall, That the sum of fifteen
dollars be granted to be expended on the
concession line between the 2nd and 3rd
concessions opposite lot 14.—Carried.

Mr. J. Robe was heard concerning
his road. No action taken.

A communication from Mr. Thos.
Robson asking for a grant on his road
was read and laid over for future con-
sideration.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, seconded
by Mr. Howie, the council adjourned
to meet at Cobocook on the 24th day of
August. School trustees will please
furnish the clerk with their requisitions
for rates before that date.

On July 11th about 150 lives were
lost by a landslide at St. Gervais-le-
Bains in Savoy.

Three white men and 101 Chinamen
were killed in a gunpowder explosion
near San Francisco on Saturday. The
explosion was terrific, and property was
damaged for miles around.

On Friday, July 8th, a fire in St.
John's, Newfoundland, destroyed 2500
houses and other property to the value of
about \$20,000,000. The 14,000 people
rendered homeless, 5,000 of whom are
utterly destitute, are receiving assist-
ance from all quarters.
