The job was under the superintendence of Mr. Thomas Walters, who was assisted by Mr. Ross. The supplementary work on the side dam at the Falls was commenced on the 14th inst., and took just a week, Mr. Kennedy, who had it in charge, returning to his home in Bobaygeon on Monday.

ACCIDENT TO MR. FIELDING.—The *Minden Echo* says:—Mr. Wm. Fielding, Crown Lands Agent, Minden, got a severe ducking in Kimmount a few days ago. Mr. Fielding was going through the sheds in the rear of Mr. Dunbar's hotel, and opening a door, he stepped into a trap hole through which water is taken for the stables; the buildings at this point overhanging the river. Fortunately he succeeded in grasping a beam, to which he clung until his calls for help brought assistance, when he was rescued. His escape from drowning was a close one, the water being deep and he is not a swimmer. In falling he hurt his knee joint, which still gives him considerable pain.
