### The Lindsay Central.

The tenth Lindsay Central Exhibition was held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week, and the weather being delightful, was a great success. The exhibits of cattle, heavy horses and agricultural implements were not quite as numerous as usual, but the total number of entries was over the average. The show was formally opened on Wednesday by the Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, who made neat replies to the various addresses read to him, and brief speeches were delivered by Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, and other notabilities. The band, the volunteers and the public school children were all pressed into service, the latter singing Rule Britannia and giving a very pretty exhibition of flag drill. In the evening a grand display of fireworks was given by professor Hand of Hamilton. It is needless to say that there was plenty of horse racing, or "speeding in the ring," as it is called, without which it would be difficult now-a-day to attract much of a crowd.

### Be Consistent.

A few years ago when the Minister of Education was preparing a selection of scripture for use in the public schools, our Tory Orange brethren raised a great hue and cry over the fact that Archbishop Lynch had been consulted along with the leading divines of the Protestant Churches in compiling the selections; and, led by our present M. P., the editor of the *Warder*, urged that alone as a sufficient reason why the Mowat Government should be overthrown. Only the other day a leading member of our local lodge declared that if Mr. Laurier were made Premier there would be a rebellion in Ontario. We would invite all those apostles of consistency to carefully peruse the leading article in the *Warder* of the 16th inst., and the following clipping from the *Mail* of Wednesday, the 21st, and ask them to define their position in the present crisis. Are they prepared to stand by their former platform? or will they, for the sake of toryism, do like a certain Tory editor did who for a long time had been violently urging a certain course on a leading question of the day, and who, when he received orders from Ottawa to stop his nonsense, as the policy of the Government was the very opposite of what he was booming, and that he must support it, replied: "It's a d—d sharp curve, but I suppose I'll have to take it?" The *Mail* says:—

"Le Canada's statement that Sir John Thompson came to Toronto for the purpose of consulting Archbishop Walsh upon the reconstruction of the Cabinet calls forth some indignant remarks from the *St. Thomas Times*, a Conservative paper. It points out that the story has not been contradicted, and adds: "The Ultramontane party in the Romish Church is in the ascendant here at the present time, thanks to that woeful part of legislation known as the Jesuit Estate bills. By that Act the Jesuits were enthroned in this country. The class of Roman Catholics who deny the temporal power of the Pope are in the minority, and free Catholicism is at a discount. Much as we have resented the exclusion of Mr. Meredith from the Dominion Cabinet, we prefer to have him remain outside of it forever and a day rather than accept office by the grace of Archbishop Walsh or any other

prelate who is the representative of Papal supremacy or the most obedient servant of the Vatican. It would be altogether too high a price to pay for a portfolio in the Dominion Cabinet to make the Pope of Rome virtual ruler of the Dominion of Canada."

### Fenelon Agricultural Show.

The annual fall show of the Fenelon Agricultural Society was held in the park south of the river on Thursday and Friday of last week, and we wish that we could consistently with veracity say that it was a good one, which it certainly was not. There is no denying that the great Central Exhibition at Toronto has a baleful effect on county shows, and the latter again militate against those got up in the different townships; but, notwithstanding this, Fenelon is fighting hard, and the falling off of this year is to be ascribed chiefly to the unfavorable weather, as the number of entries was fully up to the average. Rain has, of course, a more deterrent effect upon ladies than on the sterner and more waterproof sex, and it was in the fine arts and domestic manufactures that deficiencies were most observable. There was a fair turn-out of very good horses and cattle and a large number of remarkably fine sheep, but there were only three or four pigs on the ground and just a dozen coops of poultry. Mr. Robson, of the Cameron Lake foundry, exhibited a few of his well known agricultural implements, and Messrs McDougall & Brandon showed a "Bain" waggon, for which they are agents here. There were some exceedingly good samples of grain, roots, vegetables and fruit, among the latter apples being particularly observable, and nearly all the exhibits by ladies, up-stairs as well as down, were very creditable to them, some few being equal to the best we have ever seen at previous township shows.

The bicycle race did not come off, as there were none on the ground, and Sam Hughes failed to appear.

### Foot-ball.

On Thursday, 22nd inst. our foot-ball team drove over to Bobcaygeon to meet the Lakefield team, who arrived there about 2 p. m. per steamer *Golden City*. As the last game between the teams resulted in a draw, both sides were determined to win and thus decide the supremacy. At the end of one hour's play, in which the Falls was slightly stronger, the game was still a draw, and it was decided to play another ten minutes each way. Both teams now redoubled their efforts, Lakefield being determined to "rush her up just once"; but it was not to be. In the last ten minutes R. Delury secured the ball shortly after the "kick off" and carried it well up the wing and dropped it on goal, where W. T. Junkin was waiting for it. He did not miss, but by a good shot beat the Lakefield goal keeper, thus deciding the match in favor of Fenelon Falls by one goal to none, and adding another to the unbroken list of victories this season. The following was the team:—R. Taggart; goal, T. H. Austin and M. Haskill, backs; A. Northey, A. Head and T. Graham, half-backs; D. Twomey, T. Edwards, E. Fyson, R. Delury and W. T. Junkin, Capt., forwards.
