The Land for the Settler Only.

In almost every letter that a special commissioner of the Globe, now traveling over the Northwest, sends to that journal reference is made to the injury done the country by the tying up of large blocks of land in the hands of speculators. Towns are kept back, railway development is hindered, the building of roads is rendered difficult and the establishment of a really efficient school system is made almost impossible.

All this is the result of the foolish policy of the Government and the popular craze of ten years ago. At that time everybody was wildly anxious to speculate in Northwest lands, and the Government facilitated this most injurious sort of speculation by allowing companies to secure possession of large blocks on absurdly easy terms. But the area dealt with was so great that the boomers were unable to corner the whole of it, and the transactions indulged in have, as a consequence, in many cases proved anything but profitable. This again has so embarrassed the companies that they have been unable even to comply with the lenient conditions of occupation imposed, and the land must, in a number of instances, have become a forfeit to the Crown.

It is the duty of Parliament to inquire into this whole matter with a view of resuming possession of all lands to which present holders have no title. It is not yet too late to carry out one of the few practical ideas laid down by Edward Blake by insisting upon reserving the great domain in the far west for the actual settler, and effect must be given to this idea if the present generation is to receive value from our priceless possessions beyond the great lakos.—*News.*

A Promising Lithographic Quarry.

Mr. Harry Grundy, proprietor of the Harvey Lithograph Quarry on the banks of Pigeon Lake, has a sample of polished lithograph stone, finished by Alexander Cable & Co., Toronto, on exhibition at the store of Muckleston & Co. The stone is polished to a very fine degree and as smooth surfaced as glass. When polished it is worth 16 cents per pound. The lithographers inform Mr. Grundy that the stone contains no objectionable matter, such as brimstone, flint, etc., and is one of the finest samples of lithograph stone that has come under their notice. Mr. Grundy showed a reporter this morning some clear and very accurate specimens of lithographing of the large manufacturing establishment of the Cosgrove Brewing and Malting Co., Toronto. A communication to town states that lithographing is done by either engraving the stone or transfer, which is the way the present examples of the work in Mr. Grundy's possession were done.—*Peterborough Examiner.*

Gen. Carl Muller, the last surviving German who took part in the battle of Waterloo, died on Friday at Hanover, aged 99.

Lord Alfred Tennyson, the poet laureate, died, full of years and honors, on Friday last, and was followed on Wednesday to his resting place in Westminster Abbey by an immense concourse of mourners of all ranks from royalty downwards.

An Ancient Birdland.

For ages before its occupation by man New Zealand swarmed with great wingless birds, which found here no carnivorous enemies, but an abundance of vegetable food. The moss not only existed in vast numbers and for thousands of years, but had such diversity of form as to embrace no less than seven genera, containing twenty-five species—a remarkable fact which is unparalleled in any other part of the world. The commonest kinds in the North Island were only from two and one-half to four feet high. Those of the South Island were mostly from four to six feet tall, while the giant forms, reaching twelve and thirteen feet, were always rare. Immense deposits of moa bones have been found in localities to which they appear to have been washed from the hills in tertiary times. Skeletons on the surface of the ground, with skin and ligaments still attached, have given the impression that these birds have been exterminated in very recent years, but other facts point to a different conclusion. Tradition seems to show, according to Mr. F. W. Hutton, that the moa became extinct in the North Island soon after the arrival of the Maoris in New Zealand—that is, not less than 400 to 500 years ago—and in the South Island about a hundred years later. The fresh appearing skin and ligaments are supposed to have been preserved by unusually favorable conditions.—*Scientific American.*

A New Vegetable.

A new vegetable is about to be introduced through the American Department of Agriculture. It is the root of the calla lily, which resembles somewhat in appearance the ordinary Irish tuber, with the addition of a few whiskers, which have nothing to do with the qualities of the article as an esculent. It is more elongated, and when cut the interior is a trifle more viscid; but a section of it is so potato-like you would not be likely to distinguish any difference. In cooking, it has first to be boiled in order to destroy certain acid properties, after which it may be fried, roasted, baked or what not, according to taste. Farmers in Florida have begun to raise these calla roots for market. The plants grow readily in swamps, and so thickly that the yield of a single flooded acre is enormous. They reproduce themselves by the multiplication of their bulbs underground, so that the grower has simply to dig up the offshoots and leave the parents to propagate anew. For centuries the Egyptians have cultivated a similar crop during the seasons of the Nile overflow, and at the present time calla lily bulbs are a common vegetable in Japanese markets. So prolific and palatable are they that their propagation in many parts of the United States, where conditions are favorable, may reasonably be looked forward to as an agricultural industry of the future.—*Food.*
