Profits for Farmers in Creameries.

At a meeting held in Oxford county in connection with the travelling dairy, a reverend gentleman said he had made twenty-one dollars in four winter mouths by delivering the milk of one cow to a butter factory. The experimental dairy which the Minister of Agriculture for Ontario is sending all over the Province will do a great deal of good in showing individual farmers how to improve the quality of their home made dairy produce. But, after ail, the true solution of the butter question will be found in the more general establishment of creameries. These ensure uniformity in quality, and the experience of the Oxford clergyman shows that there is profit for the farmer in making use of the facilities they afford. If creameries were as numerous in Ontario as cheese factories are now, there can be little doubt that our exports of butter, instead of being valued at a paltry \$602,000, would equal the value of our exports of cheese -uine and a half millions .- Toronto
