**KICKED BY A HORSE.**—On Tuesday last Mr. A. Northey's only child, a little girl about four years old, was amusing herself with a small iron wheel which she was using as a hoop, and which rolled off the sidewalk behind the heels of one of a pair of horses that were standing hitched to a farmer's waggon. Just as the little one stooped to pick up her toy the animal kicked her on the face, causing her, a spectator says, to turn a complete somersault. She was picked up and carried into her father's shop, and upon examination it was ascertained that she had received no injury except a long and rather deep cut below her right eye. Dr. Graham, who was sent for, put three stitches in the wound, which he thinks will leave but a very slight mark. Had she been farther from the horse's heels, she would probably have been killed, but she was so close that she was pushed rather than struck.

**A Trade on Which Much Depends.**

The cable informed us a few days ago that pleuro pneumonia had broken out among Canadian cattle recently landed in Scotland, but this report is now denied. If the British Government is once assured that pleuro pneumonia does exist among the herds of this country the privilege of sending our animals to inland British towns on the hoof will be immediately withdrawn. On the continuance of this privilege the existence of our ocean cattle trade—a trade which has developed with marvellous rapidity and which forms one of the main props of the agriculturists of the Dominion—depends. It is to be sincerely hoped, therefore, that the correctness of the latest dispatch may shortly be officially confirmed.—News.

**Mexican Brigands.**

**NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 31.**—The Times-Democrat, Celega, Mex., says:—The town of San Juan, fifteen miles north of here on the Mexican National Railway, was the scene last night of a battle between a band of twelve brigands, under the leadership of the desperado outlaw, Antonio Gallardo, and a company of Government rurales of the place. The bandits rode into town about 9 o'clock last night and made a raid on the general store of Richardo Mendoza. They secured several hundred dollars in cash, driving the proprietor, clerk and about twenty customers into the street at the muzzle of their pistols. The rural soldiers were given the alarm of the presence of the brigands, and as the latter emerged from the store and were in the act of mounting their horses a fusillade was opened upon them by the soldiers. Gallardo and two other members of the band fell at the first volley, fatally wounded. The other brigands returned the fire and a pitched battle ensued, the outlaws fighting their way through the ranks of the soldiers. Six escaped and three were captured. Four of the soldiers were seriously wounded. The escaped bandits retained possession of the stolen money. This is the same band who a few days ago stole \$6,000 at Loria, a town a few miles from San Juan.

**Neill's Confession.**

**LONDON, Oct. 28.**—Thomas Neill Cream has confessed that from 1874 to 1881, when he was arrested in Chicago, he made a practise of poisoning dissolute girls in Canada. His numerous victims he says, were buried without suspicion on the part of anybody that they had died unnatural deaths. A medical expert who has examined Cream says that he suffers undoubtedly from syphilis.

All information as to Thomas Neill Cream's confession comes from Mr. Waters, his solicitor. Mr. Waters says that he probably will not make the details public until after the execution. Cream confessed to him everything in his Canadian career, minutely describing the girls murdered, his method in killing them and his devices to escape detection.

"He fairly made every hair on my head stand on end," said Mr. Waters last evening. "His story was startling beyond anything I have ever before heard."

After his confession Cream became angry at Mr. Waters, and threatened to "do" him after the trial. Mr. Waters refused absolutely to make any further statement.

At Chattanooga, Tenn., 75 pounds of dynamite exploded on a Government dredge. One man had his head blown off and two others were very severely injured.

A runaway car on an incline plane at Huntingdon, Pa., ran into a crowd of passengers at the Pennsylvania station, killing three men and seriously injuring two young women.

The mayor of Lemburg, Austria, has been poisoned. It is asserted the crime was committed by people who are angry because of the severe cholera precautions taken at the mayor's instance.

According to reports from the midland counties in England rain has been falling continuously in different sections of that region for from 24 to 50 hours. Thousands of acres in West Norfolk are submerged and the potato and other crops are rotting in the field. The thermometer has risen 30 degrees in 48 hours.
