Justice in Russia.

THE PEASANTS CREMATE A HORSE THIEF AND HIS FAMILY.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 26.—The Telegraph's correspondent at St. Petersburg sends an account of a terrible crime committed by peasants at Zostriki, in Lithuania. The peasants assembled in the night at the house of a horse thief whom they wished to punish. The thief was asleep at the time with his wife and five children. The peasants set fire to the hut and kept watch for the occupants. When the shrieking inmates tried to escape they were met with fiendish yells by the heartless wretches and driven back into the flames with scythes, knives and other weapons. One of the inmates was murdered. All the others were burned to death. The culprits afterwards surrendered in a body to the police.

England Alarmed.

FEARS THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL PROHIBIT ALL IMMIGRATION.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Considerable alarm has been created among English working people by the report that the United States is about to pass a law stopping immigration altogether. It is feared that, as wages are higher in England than on the Continent, the tide will turn altogether in this direction.

Already the influx of foreigners, and especially of Russians and Poles willing to work for small wages, has had a perceptible effect upon the labor market, and many Englishmen feel that they are out of jobs because the Russians and Poles have underbid them.

There is also a large influx of Russian and Polish women who are gradually drifting into employment as servants and in other domestic capacities, the lower rate of wages paid them being compensation to employers for their ignorance of the language. Thus Englishmen and Englishwomen are being driven out of work by immigration.

The only class that favors free immigration is the manufacturers. They hold it over the operatives in the textile industries as a menace of what might happen if the operatives are too persistent in their demands for higher wages, or in their opposition to reduced wages.

As some of the newspapers are owned by or published in the interests of manufacturers, such newspapers are very chary of dealing with the subject. Workingmen, however, are all alive to the issue, and will press it upon their Parliamentary representatives.

Has the Liar Survived.

BRISTOL, Tenn., Nov. 26.—An extraordinary infant was born recently near Crab Orchard, Va. The child was well developed, had a full set of teeth and long flowing hair of a sombre hue. It seemed to be possessed of all the mental faculties of maturity. In a clear voice it said, "Time here is short." It then closed its eyes and died. This, together with the appearance of the comet, which is supposed to carry death and destruction in its wake, has created considerable consternation in that community. It has made an unmistakable impression on the more sensible, and the superstitious are living in a state of dread, expecting every moment to hear a blast from Gabriel's horn.

The S. A. barracks at Orillia have been burned.

Many persons have been killed and much damage done in La Union, San Salvador, by an earthquake.

Sam Johnston, a negro who was born in Africa 115 years ago, was murdered and robbed near Savannah, Ga., on Saturday.

A mountain panther or huge catamount attacked David I. Grim of Stoney Run, Pa., a few days ago while hunting on the Blue mountains. The beast killed one of Grim's dogs and then leaped upon the hunter. The catamount was wounded by several bullets, and finally escaped through the brush.

France has spent 360,000,000 on her army since 1871 and an enormous sum upon her Navy. This is the sort of armed peace that the German victory of 1870 has forced all Europe to pay for. The Courier des Etats-Unis does not know which is most astonishing, the size of the figures or the wonderful development of France, which has led her to pay such a sum and steadily prosper.

A somewhat rare and curious sight was seen in Paris a few days ago. About 60 gypsy caravans were drawn up in line, and with their occupants (about 500 in number), publicly disinfected. This measure was taken in consequence of the discovery of five or six cases of cholera among the gypsies, who had recently arrived from Belgium and Prussia. The caravans were found to be in a most filthy condition.

M. de Lesseps, the great French engineer, is 87 years old. Luckey, the supposed Smith's Falls murderer, still protests his innocence. Oil barrels have been found floating off Orient Point, near Green Port, L. I. They are supposed to be part of the cargo of some vessel which has foundered at sea. Some of the barrels are consigned to Halifax, N. S., and are full of oil.
