Canada Moves Along.

AND THE SECRETARY OF THE DULUTH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NOTES THE FACT.

DULUTH, Minn., Dec. 3.—Secretary Thompson, of the Chamber of Commerce, has prepared his letter calling for a convention to consider the construction of a ship canal through American territory, from the great lakes to the Hudson river, and thus to the sea. In it he says: "Commercial considerations sink into insignificance in comparison with the importance of this waterway as an essential portion of national defense and as a guard to national honors. Inside of five years Canada will have a waterway 14 feet deep through her own territory, all the way from lake Superior to the sea. Her vessels and her commerce can then go unhindered out from the heart of the continent over all oceans to the markets of the world, while there are more than 150 warships in the English navy which a depth of 14 feet would suffice to bring into the lakes from the sea. Is it not best that a convention should be held after the Christmas holidays in Washington, so that the attention of the Congress may be directly and forcibly called to the necessity for immediate action, and needed legislation secured before the present Congress expires by limitation?"

Earthquake Shocks.

ONE THIRD OF AN ISLAND SPLIT OFF BY AN EARTHQUAKE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.—The steamer City of Panama brings further news of the earthquake in San Salvador, October 18th. Signs of activity were noticed about the crater of the Conchagua volcano, near La Union, in the Gulf of Fonseca. At 10 o'clock that night came a violent earthquake and the 5,000 inhabitants of La Union fled to the beach. Shock after shock struck the city and the older buildings tumbled in ruins. The stone cathedral was reduced to a formless heap and 50 or 60 other buildings were wrecked. Twenty-four persons were injured. One-third of the island of Conchagua in the Gulf of Fonseca, seven miles from Latenuin, was split off by the shock, and suddenly sank out of sight. The crater of Conchagua did not break forth again, but it shows signs of coming eruptions.

Frozen to Death.

Further particulars of the death on the prairie of C. F. Church, of Winnipeg, traveller for the Sanford Manufacturing Company, of Hamilton, are to hand. The Macleod (Alberta) Gazette says that Mr. Church arrived here on November 19, and on the 22nd hired a four horse team and started off for Pincher Creek, intending to then go to Lee's Creek and thereafter return to Macleod. On Wednesday he left the dry forks of the Kootenia river for Lee's Creek, but got mired in his bearings towards nightfall. The kingbolt of the wagon came out, and the vehicle was rendered useless. His teamster proposed to him that they take a horse each and strike out for shelter. Church, being played out, refused, and told the teamster to go for assistance. At 3 o'clock next morning the frozen body of the young man was found by a rescuing party. All night a snowstorm had raged, and the rescuers had to brave an atmosphere 20 degrees below zero.

A Mica Mine.

Mr. John Whitney has returned home from a trip to the back country, bringing with him splendid specimens of mica found in the township of Denburgh, Addington county. The mica as it appears on the surface is of superior quality and is sure to become better as the deeper part of the lead is reached. Mr. Coxwell, who is collecting specimens of Ontario minerals to send to the Chicago Exposition, after examining Mr. Whitney's samples says they are the best he has ever seen from the surface. Mr. Whitney's lead is about eighteen feet in thickness and can be traced from 30 to 40 rods. Next spring Mr. Whitney will begin active operations in the development of his mine.—Peterborough Examiner.

The giant whaleback steamer Christopher will carry 5,000 people. She is intended to run between Chicago and the World's Fair grounds.
