DIVISION COURT.—There being no fewer than twenty-four suits and three judgment summonses on the docket for the Division Court here on Monday last, it was feared that a considerable number of them would have to be postponed; but Mr. McSweeney, who officiated as judge, sat (with intervals for meals) until nearly midnight and again next morning for a couple of hours. Had there been the usual amount of business at the Haliburton court, which was held on Tuesday, the judge would have had to leave the Falls at 4 p. m. on Monday, but there was so little that he postponed the sittings until the train arrived on Tuesday and so got time here to dispose of all the cases except a few that from various causes it was necessary to lay over until next court, which will be held on January 27th.

The Thompson Cabinet.

According to the Empire there will be twelve Cabinet Ministers with portfolios, two without, and there will be three holders of portfolios outside the Cabinet. This makes seventeen all told—a fairly good outfit for a country of five million people.

The Empire's slate is as follows: Prime Minister and Minister of Justice—Sir John S. D. Thompson, Minister of Public Works—Hon. J. A. Ouimet. Minister of Trade and Commerce—Hon. McKenzie Bowell. Minister of Railways and Canals—Hon. John Haggart. Minister of Militia—Hon. J. C. Patterson.

Minister of Agriculture—Hon. A. R. Angers. Secretary of State—Hon. John Costigan. Minister of Finance—Hon. G. E. Foster.

Minister of Marine and Fisheries—Hon. C. H. Tupper. Postmaster-General—Sir Adolphe P. Caron. Minister of the Interior—Hon. T. M. Daly. President of the Council—W. B. Ives.

Without portfolio—Hon. Frank Smith and Sir John Caldwell Abbott. The three portfolios without a seat in the Cabinet he placed as follows. Solicitor-General—Mr. Curran. Comptroller of Inland Revenue—Mr. Wallace.

Comptroller of Customs—Mr. Tisdale. The senior government organ adds that Bowell will share with Angers the labor of leading the Senate. This will make four Cabinet Ministers in the Senate.

Forty-two persons left Kingston on Thursday for the United States, where they will reside permanently. Seventy-four lives were lost by the sinking of the Japanese warship Chishimaru, which collided with the British steamer Ravenna in the Inland Sea.

Elisworth Wyatt, of the Dalton gang, for whom a reward of \$10,200 was offered, was captured in Cary, Ind. He was not in the Coffeyville raid, but is wanted for many crimes.

On the occasion of a charivari lately held to commemorate the wedding of Mr. John Sheir, near Leaksdale, Scott township, two of the wedding guests were shot with powder. Mr. Tiffin was wounded in the hand and Wesley Oxtoby received a charge in the face at close range which will lay him up for some time and may result in the loss of his sight. The charivari is illegal, and no self-respecting young man should take part in it.

Immigration returns, as shown by the Dominion officer, go to show that a surprising number of settlers arrived in the Northwest in November, the figures being 1,148. This makes a total for 11 months of 36,111. November is not considered a phenomenal month for land sales, but, during the last thirty days, the C. P. R. land department has disposed of 33,500 acres in Manitoba and the territories, on which they have realized \$124,000.

James Beck, an aged resident of Bridgeton, N. J., was buried on Dec. 1 John and Anthony Beck, sons of the dead man, stopped the funeral services by attempting to thrash the minister. The clergyman had destroyed a small bottle of rum he found in the house. This so enraged the Beck boys that they threatened to thrash the preacher and were only prevented by sheer force. After the men had been locked up in a side room the services were concluded.

Rain making experiments in Texas have failed.

A heavy snowstorm prevailed for 20 hours at Omaha and trains were delayed.

A man in Baltimore, Md., has invented an electric sleigh which travels at the rate of fifteen miles an hour.

By the death of Mrs. E. V. Ashton at Tunbridge Wells, Cheshire, Eng., \$600,000 a year is left to 28 Boston charities.

Heavy snowstorms are reported throughout the United Kingdom. The mails are delayed, and many sheep have died.

Paul Jordan, who claimed to be an illegitimate son of Napoleon Bonaparte, has just died at Findlay, Ohio, aged 106 years.

A negro, Cornelius Coffee, shot two white men at Keystone, W. Va. He was bound to a tree by a mob and riddled with bullets.

Heavy snowstorms prevail throughout Hungary. Most of the railways are blocked with snow. All wheel traffic in Buda Pesth is suspended.

Joseph Kane, a Lake Shore employee, went on a long spree a few days ago and his wife had him arrested. Promises of reform secured his release. He hunted up his wife and at once emptied the contents of a revolver into her body. Kane then ran down a steep grade on the Philadelphia & Erie road, uncoupled the rear car of a train, gave it a push and sprang in front of it. He laid his neck on the rail and his head was severed. Four little children were orphaned by the tragedy. Kane lost his father and three brothers in railroad accidents and considered himself ill-fated.

Charley Mitchell, the prize fighter, who on October 7th was sentenced to two months' imprisonment at hard labor for brutally assaulting George Salvage, and who appealed to the county sessions, appeared in the Bow street police court on Thursday, and offered to take his sentence and withdraw his appeal. The presiding magistrate refused to interfere, and said that Mitchell could surrender to the police if he liked, but it would be optional with the police whether they would take him in custody. The motive for Mitchell's course is that he is afraid of a more severe sentence in the sessions than that from which he appealed.
